THE fire which completely destroyed the printing establishment of Messrs. Collingridge, in Aldersgate Street, following so closely upon a similar accident at the office of Messrs. Dickens and Evans, a few weeks since, has been the means of drawing attention to the importance of extending to our large printing establishments the architectural improvements designed to resist fire which have been proved so signally successful of late in other buildings. There are, it is obvious, few establishments in which, if the *employés* are at work, as was actually the case at Messrs. Collingridge's, a fire is likely to be attended with more disastrous consequences than in a gigantic printing-house, and it would not be difficult to point to large offices at the present moment, where the staircases are utterly unfitted for the egress of the men, and where even the doors only open upwards instead of downwards, thus opposing an effectual barrier in case of a sudden rush. Under such circumstances a fire, or even an alarm of fire, must produce terrible results, and the difficulty with which, owing to the rapidity of the conflagration, the compositors engaged upon the *City Press* escaped, is a sufficient evidence of what must have occurred in a less well-regulated establishment. When, on the other hand, we turn to the possibility of making a building practically fire-proof, and of confining a fire when it breaks out, to its original seat, we have in the Civil Service Stores in Chandos Street



Strand—a building which could scarcely have been better designed if it had been intended for a printing-office—a case in point. Those who witnessed the outbreak of the fire on these premises, and saw the volumes of smoke issuing from the building, gave it up for lost, and this feeling was at first shared by those within; but the excellence of the plan on which it was constructed enabled the firemen to shut the fire up, and to occupy with perfect safety the remaining floors. We have yet much to learn in the direction of our street architecture, but the frequent fires at our largest printing firms establish beyond a doubt the necessity for the utmost effort on the part of architect and builder to prevent the risk to life and limb which is inevitable when due care is not exercised.

Mr. Frederic Greenwood's establishment of the *St. James's Gazette*, which has its home at the offices in Dorset Street once occupied by the *Morning Star* and the *Hour*, will carry with it many good wishes, as it is unquestionably an advantage to the metropolis to possess a journal which is not tied down to any political party and which is conducted on independent principles. Mr. Greenwood's *bête noir*, to judge from his prospectus, is the 'destructive radicalism' which he espies in the constitution of the new House of Commons, and against which he proclaims war to the knife; but with the exception of this extreme sect of politicians, he promises a fair field and no favour to the rest of the world. The new paper is fashioned on the same model as the *Pall Mall Gazette*, and its staff is mainly identical with the former staff of that journal.

On the 28th ult. a meeting was held at the South London Free Library, in Upper Kennington Lane, under the presidency of Sir James Lawrence, M.P., to further the purpose of founding a free library for Southwark. The place where the meeting was held, itself a free library, established by voluntary contributions, had been so successful that the council had projected a branch reading-room for Southwark, counting on the support of those largely employing labour in Southwark to join them in the management and to contribute towards the needful expenses. The chairman earnestly supported the movement, and stated that last year 10,000 persons attended this free library—a fact, he urged, which was in itself an advocacy of the claims of the institution to support. Mr. Stiff, the Chairman of the Works Committee of the London School Board, spoke of the free library as a great educational institution, carrying on beyond the school age the education given in earlier years. Mr. A. Cohen, Q.C., M.P., Miss Helen Taylor, Mr. Edward Clarke, Q.C., and others advocated the claims of the parent institution and the projected one to the support of the public generally and of educationists, and Mr. Rossiter, the hon. secretary, stated that the new library was in East Street, Walworth, near the boundary of Southwark, though not actually in the borough.

The Byron statue in Hamilton Gardens, Hyde Park, was unveiled on the 24th ult. by Lord Houghton in a purely informal manner, in presence of the other members of the committee. The present uncompleted condition of the monument would have rendered a formal ceremony inconvenient. In unveiling the statue Lord Houghton said,—'I here unveil in the sight of the British people the form of the great poet of the earlier portion of this century in the full ripeness of his fame. More than two generations have already delighted in his genius, and it is our happiness to present this monument to the satisfaction of those who are to come. If such memory of his music has not been evoked long ago as was fabled in the Egyptian statue by the radiance of the Dawn, it is something that the meridian splendour will now awake the emotion and gratitude of future millions of mankind. The generous Government of Greece will shortly contribute a becoming pedestal of Hellenic marble to this impersonation of the hero of their independence.' Among those present were Lord Stanhope, Lord Dorchester, Lord Barrington, Mr. Frederick Locker, Mr. John Murray, jun., Mr. Drury, Lady Jersey, Mr. Belt, the sculptor, and Mr. Richard Edgcumbe, who has officiated as honorary secretary to the committee since 1875.

An interesting and curious proof of progress in the Sandwich Islands is furnished by the 'Hawaiian Almanack and Annual for 1880,' with many pages of smart advertisements, and a complete Court Calendar. The almanack covers seventy-six pages besides advertisements, the latter affording a pretty fair criterion of the stage of civilisation already attained in these islands. We learn from the almanack that at Honolulu a reading-room gives access to the principal periodicals of the world, upwards of 100 of which are set down in a newsagent's book as being regularly supplied to his customers. Indeed, it would be difficult to name any article in demand in civilised society that could not be supplied at one or other of the various stores and warehouses in Honolulu. When we look in the almanack itself we find it contains pretty much the same kind of information to be found in the almanacks of countries where civilisation began 1,000 or more years ago.

The copyright and entire interest in the *St. James's Magazine* and *United Empire Review* is to be sold by Messrs. Puttick and Simpson on the 16th inst.

Dr. Freeman writes on the Election and the Eastern Question in the *Contemporary Review* for June.

A recent number of the *New York Independent* contains an article by the Rev. R. L. Stanton, D.D., on 'The Conversion of Charles Reade,' giving an account of the abandonment by that eminent dramatist and novelist of sceptical views, and his earnest resolve to take part in Christian work, owing to the influence exerted upon him through attendance upon the ministry of the Rev. Charles Graham, of Shepherd's-bush. Dr. Stanton states that Mr. Reade has prepared very copious notes for an autobiography, and adds: 'I understand, also, that he is meditating upon a delineation of Scripture characters and events.'

According to the *Pen*, Mr. Tennyson, for his poem 'De Profundis,' which appeared in the last number of the *Nineteenth Century*, was paid £300. It consisted of 65 lines.

The annual general meeting of the members of the London Library took place yesterday afternoon. The report shows that the Library is in a condition of steadily increasing prosperity. The experiment of buying the freehold of the house in St. James's-square has not crippled the book-purchasing power of the committee, the total number of volumes added to the Library being 38 more than in the previous year. A useful supplement to the catalogue of 1875 is announced as nearly ready, and will be sold to members at cost price.

The valuable musical library of Mr. C. L. Gruneisen will be sold by Messrs. Debenham, Storr, and Sons, on Thursday next.

Messrs. Sotheby, Wilkinson, and Hodge will sell the library of the late Mrs. Benzon on the 14th instant. The collection includes many costly French works.

The lectures on 'Eternal Punishment,' which Dean Goulburn is now delivering on Sunday afternoons, at St. James's, Piccadilly, are to be published by Messrs. Rivingtons.

Messrs. Little, Brown, & Co. of Boston's catalogue of law books deserves more than the passing notice, the line or so of enumeration, which is given to an ordinary catalogue. It arrests our attention by careful analyses of many of the works, enumeration of the contents in others, illustrative letters from eminent men, and press notices; which, being printed in a smaller letter than that of the titles, typographically illustrate and throw up the more prominent setting of the titles themselves. Messrs. Little and Brown's law catalogue is preceded by an index of subjects, itself being alphabetical in arrangement.

We are asked to draw attention to Lady Strangford's relief fund for the famine in Kurdistan, Armenia, and Western Persia, which has the hearty sympathy of the Archbishop of Canterbury. In the words of the circular before us, 'whole villages and vast districts in the regions named are utterly given over to the horrors of starvation; men and women by thousands and tens of thousands are thankful if they are fortunate enough to get roots, or leaves, or *earthworms* to eat. Children are being sold for a morsel of food, or being abandoned to perish.'

Messrs. Kent & Co.'s beautifully-printed miniature edition of the poets now includes Longfellow, Milton, and Wordsworth. A more detailed account of these pretty little volumes will be found in our advertising pages.

Sir Rowland Hill spent some of his latter years in writing a 'History of Penny Postage,' and in this work is naturally included a history of his own life from the year when he first turned his thoughts towards postal reform to the date of his retirement from the public service. It was Sir William's wish that his nephew, Dr. G. B. Hill (the author of 'Dr. Johnson: his Friends and his Critics') should edit this work, and should at the same time render it a complete record of his whole career by writing his life in those years which were not included in the history of penny postage. Messrs. Thos. De La Rue & Co. have the work in preparation, and it will be ready for publication early in the autumn. It will be brought out in two volumes octavo, and will contain a portrait of Sir R. Hill, etched by M. P. Rajon, besides other illustrations.

The correspondence of George Sand is about to be published, and persons in possession of letters from that gifted authoress are requested to send copies of them to M. Calman Levy, Rue Auber 3, Paris.

The council of the Royal Geographical Society have awarded Dr. Crowther, the black bishop of the Niger Territory, a gold watch 'in recognition of the services he has rendered to geography.'

The election of M. Léon Say to the Presidency of the French Senate will deprive London of the presence of the gifted author as Ambassador to the Court of St. James's.

The Honorary Freedom and Livery of the Worshipful Company of Stationers is, we understand, to be presented to the Right Hon. W. H. Smith, M.P., on the 9th of June.

The Congress of the International Literary Association at Lisbon, fixed for the 1st of June, has been postponed till the 20th of September, so as to fit in with the Anthropological Congress.

Mr. Rodd, of Balliol College, Oxford, the winner of the Newdigate, is by no means an unknown poet; some graceful sonnets from his pen having already attained a wide circulation.

There appears to be some prospect of the abolition of the Press Commissionership at Calcutta. The late incumbent has been transferred to another appointment, and no *locum*

tenens is to be appointed pending Mr. Lethbridge's return from England, the business of the office being meanwhile carried on by the clerks.

On the 21st ult. the Baroness Burdett-Coutts, accompanied by Mr. J. Tennant, F.G.S., Mr. H. Wagner, Mr. John Hassard, Miss Hassard, Mr. E. C. Johnson, Mrs. Johnson, and Miss Shirley, visited Columbia Market for the purpose of opening a reading-room and library for the use of the tenants on the Columbia estate. The library contains upwards of 500 volumes of the best authors, and the reading-room is supplied with daily and weekly newspapers, periodicals, &c. The Baroness has provided the funds to form the institution, but in order to make it self-supporting one penny per week will be charged to the members. Additional works will be added from time to time, and it is hoped that this will form the nucleus of a fine library, the want of which has long been felt.

The liberal students at St. Andrew's University will nominate Mr. E. A. Freeman, the historian, for the rectorship at present held by Lord Selborne. The election takes place in November.

The Duke of Westminster, the Marquis of Bute, Earl Stanhope, Lord Ronald Gower, Sir T. Erskine May, Sir George Campbell, M.P., Sir W. Muir, Sir W. Thomson, Lady Eastlake, Lady Lush, Professors Darwin and Max Müller, and many others, have recently forwarded donations to the Free Library, London Street, Bethnal Green, E. The institution is supported entirely by voluntary contributions, and the committee require 10,000 volumes.

Prague papers announce that a manuscript translation of the 'Nibelungenlied' into the Czech language has been discovered in the library of the cathedral of that city. The manuscript belongs to the 14th century.

We think that the following account of Mr. Isaac Taylor's beginning in literature will be found interesting. It is taken from 'Jane Taylor's Life and Letters,' lately published by Messrs. Nelson and Sons :

Josiah Condor (*sic*) was at that time editor of the *Eclectic Review*, with Robert Hall, John Foster, and Olinthus Gregory among its supporters. Another thinker was added, when Isaac Taylor joined its staff of contributors. His first independent venture was made in 1822, in a small volume called 'Elements of Thought,' succeeded by a new translation of the 'Characters of Theophrastus' with pictorial renderings of the characters, drawn and etched by himself.

There is something very grand about the way in which, in the United States, the leading libraries are maintained and increased in efficiency. We have before us the Bulletin of the Boston Public Library, dated April 1880. It is a super-royal of thirty closely printed pages in double column, devoted, not to recounting past labours, but to the titles of the 'new and more important books placed in the library during January, February, and March.' The one page which remains is occupied with library statistics, and an account of the catalogues which unlock—so to say—the treasures of the Bates Hall, and other buildings.

Mr. E. G. Brill, the well-known publisher of Leyden, is about to issue an important scientific work, of which the title is *Les Pédiculines*, par M. E. Piaget. The author is a member of the Entomological Society of the Low Countries. The work will consist of two handsomely printed volumes, royal 4to., Vol. 1. being the text, extending to about 750 pages; Vol. 2. the atlas of 56 plates, with their explanatory matter. The effect of the plates will be enhanced by their being printed on a species of tint, and then laid down on the white surface of the ordinary paper.

Messrs. Whittaker & Co. will shortly publish in their Shilling Volume Series, a new edition of Madame Cottin's popular story, 'Elizabeth, or, the Exiles of Siberia,' and a 'Handy Book of Blunders,' correcting those so frequently made in conversation and composition.

Messrs. Griffith & Farran have in the press, and will publish on the anniversary of his death, a 'Life of the Prince Imperial of France,' which has been compiled by Miss Ellen Barlee. Many who knew the young Prince have aided Miss Barlee in writing the life, and she has had the opportunity of procuring information from many special sources both in Paris and in England. The volume will consist of about 400 pages 8vo., and will contain a photograph of the Prince, and other illustrations.

Messrs Hurst & Blackett will shortly publish 'Monsieur Guizot in Private Life,' (1787-1874) by his Daughter Madame de Witt. Translated from the French by Mrs. Simpson, in 1 volume. A Second Series of Mr. Walford's 'Tales of Our Great Families,' in 2 volumes, and a new novel entitled 'A Modern Greek Heroine,' in 3 volumes.

We learn from Messrs. George Waterston & Sons, of 9 Rose Street, Newgate Street, that their show of 'Sealing Wax' at the Sydney Exhibition has received the *Highest* award.

Messrs. Unwin Brothers have also received the following gratifying intelligence :—'I have much pleasure in stating that in addition to a first prize for account books, you have been awarded a third prize for your reprint of "The Biblia Pauperum," and a first prize for letterpress printing.'—Sydney Exhibition, April 10th, 1880.

AMERICAN NEWS AND NOTES.

Messrs. D. Appleton & Co., New York, will soon issue the first part of 'Picturesque Palestine, Sinai, and Egypt,' to be completed in forty parts, illustrated by engravings on steel and wood, from designs made expressly for this work on the spot. Among the contributors to the text will be the Rev. Dr. Schaff and Dean Stanley. The book will form a companion to their 'Picturesque America,' and 'Picturesque Europe.'

The *Literary World* (Boston) prints a sample of an advance sheet from an 'Index to Shakspeare,' which Little, Brown, & Co., Boston, will publish in the course of a year. The compiler is Mr. John Bartlett, author of the well-known 'Dictionary of Familiar Quotations.'

Mr. A. F. Bandelier's monograph 'On the Social Organisation and Mode of Government of the Ancient Mexicans,' has been reprinted from the twelfth annual report of the Peabody Museum at Cambridge, Mass.

Messrs. Baker, Voorhis, & Co., New York, will publish this month the seventh edition of Theodore Sedgwick's 'Treatise on the Measure of Damages,' in 2 vols., revised and greatly enlarged. The work is edited by Arthur G. Sedgwick, and will contain extensive annotations and references to the latest and most important English and American decisions. Copies of the book can be obtained from Sampson Low & Co. A list of standard American Law Books, sold by them, will be sent to any address on application.

Mr. J. W. Bouton, New York, will shortly publish 'Freemasonry Older than Obelisks, Pyramids, and Mounds,' by John A. Weisse, M.D. This work will be illustrated with full-page coloured lithographs, and with numerous woodcuts.

It is understood that Mr. J. Eliot Cabot, who has been for some years Mr. R. W. Emerson's confidential literary adviser, will be entrusted with his unpublished papers, and will have authority to write his life.

We find in the *Literary World* (Boston), the statement that Mr. F. A. Brockhaus, of Leipzig, is printing an anthology called 'Modern American Lyrics,' edited by Karl Knortz, of Johnstown, Philadelphia. It will be an octavo of about 600 pages, and will contain the best lyrics written in America within the last thirty years. The book is intended for the educated classes of Germany, who all read English, and it will be followed by a critical history of American literature, written in German, by the same hand.

Mr. Presley Blakiston, the Philadelphia Medical Publisher, has begun the issue of the *Intelligencer*, a monthly record of medical and medico-scientific literature. Mr. Blakiston will have ready shortly 'A Dictionary of German Medical Terms,' by Fancourt Barnes, M.D.

Prof. Crane, of Cornell University, is preparing for publication a work on the 'Folk Tales of Italy.' His qualification for the task is shown by the fact that articles of his upon Italian folk lore, in the *North American Review* and *Lippincott's Magazine*, have been translated into Italian by recognised scholars.

Messrs. E. P. Dutton & Co., New York, have now ready a new single volume edition of Miss Mary L. Booth's 'History of the City of New York,' which first appeared about a dozen years ago.

Mr. Wilkie Collins has written an article on the 'International Copyright' question for the June number of the *International Review*, New York.

The *Publishers' Weekly* (New York) in a recent issue says, 'Mr. George F. Fort's "History of Medical Economy during the Middle Ages," previously announced, is now on the eve of publication. The scope of the work includes the narration of medical art under the Roman Emperors to Galen's time, and the modifying influences of Alexandrine schools in producing a regular system of magic cures. The progress of this interesting phenomenon, as a moralistic episode of the Middle Ages, by the side of ancient medical text-books in the monasteries, and the gradual development of the science in the Italian universities, aided by alchemy and astrology, are also sketched out. Among other features of Mr. Fort's History are treatises on the curative powers of gems, incantations, &c. The work closes with the fourteenth century, and will make a volume of about 500 pages.'

A new edition of Colonel J. W. Forney's 'Anecdotes of Public Men,' including sketches of several hundred additional celebrities in America and abroad, is about to be published by Harper & Brothers, New York. The first edition of this series of sketches, published in 1873, attracted general attention, and met with the heartiest encomiums of his brethren of the press. In addition to the book previously mentioned, Messrs. Harper will have ready this month the fifth and concluding volume of Gieseler's 'Text Book of Church History,' the unfinished translation of which, by the late Prof. Henry B. Smith, has been completed by Miss Mary A. Robinson, a daughter of the distinguished Dr. Edward Robinson. They have also in preparation an important volume of original work in art, by Charles Eliot Norton, entitled, 'Historical Studies of Church Building in the Middle Ages' (Venice, Sienna, Florence); and a treatise on 'The Phœcians of Homer,' annotated by Prof. A. C. Merriam, of Columbia College.

The co-partnership of Houghton, Osgood, & Co., Boston, has been terminated by the retirement of Mr. Osgood, who becomes the head of a new firm, J. R. Osgood & Co., devoted to the heliotype business as a speciality, and retaining chiefly the publication of the *American Architect*, and of Mr. Sweetser's guide-books. The new firm of Houghton, Mifflin, & Co. bears for the first time the name of one who has long been a junior partner, we believe, and includes Mr. Lawson Valentine of New York. Among its first publications will be 'Ballads and Lyrics,' selected and arranged by Henry Cabot Lodge, editor of the *International Review*; primarily designed for school use. Other works which this firm have in preparation are a new and uniform edition of Dr. O. Holmes's 'Breakfast Table' Series, 'Elsie Venner,' 'The Guardian Angel,' and the 'Poetical Works'; Mr. Thos. Bailey Aldrich's 'Stillwater Tragedy,' and Mr. W. D. Howells's 'Undiscovered Country,' both now appearing serially in the *Atlantic Monthly*; a new and uniform edition of Mr. Bret Harte's 'Prose and Poetical Works'; a Globe edition of Nathaniel Hawthorne's writings in six volumes; Mr. Richard Grant White's 'Every-Day English,' which appeared originally in the *New York Times*, and a new edition of his 'Words and their Uses'; a second edition of Mr. Samuel Roads's 'History and Traditions of Marblehead'; Miss Nora Perry's first prose volume, 'The Tragedy of the Unexpected, and other Stories'; 'The Hopeless Case,' a novel, by Mr. Edgar Fawcett; 'Adirondack Stories,' a collection of sketches of adventures in the woods, by Mr. P. Deming, an author who formerly contributed to the *Atlantic*; and Mr. H. P. Arnold's 'Gleanings from Pontresina and the Upper Engadine,' a story of foreign saunterings. The same firm will also add to their Law publications, a 'Treatise on the Law of Chattel Mortgages,' by Leonard A. Jones, of Boston.

A valuable collection of autograph letters, received by Mr. William Lloyd Garrison in connection with the anti-slavery struggle in the United States, has been given by his sons to the library of Cornell University.

Messrs. Jansen, McClurg, & Co., Chicago, have begun the issue of a new monthly periodical of literary news and criticism, called *The Dial*. This firm have in preparation 'The Story of Religion in England,' by the Rev. Brooke Herford; 'The Life of Mozart,' a translation from the German of Louis Nahl; and 'Demosthenes,' a translation from the French of L. Brédif, Professor in the Faculty of Letters of Toulouse, Director of the Academy of Chambéry, &c.

Messrs. C. Jewett & Co., Boston, have in preparation, in four volumes quarto, 'The Memorial History of Boston (Mass.) including the present County of Suffolk, 1630 to 1880. The work will be critically edited by Mr. Justin Winsor, Librarian of Harvard University, with the co-operation of the Rev. Edward Everett Hale, Dr. Samuel A. Green, and Dr. Charles Deane. The first volume will be published this summer, and will contain a general introduction, with papers on Boston's prehistoric period and natural history, by Profs. Putnam, Allen, and Gray, of Harvard: on its early history, by Prof. Winsor, Geo. Dexter, and C. F. Adams, junr.; on the Colonial period, by S. F. Haven, Robt. C. Winthrop, Colonel T. W. Higginson, Rev. E. E. Hale, and others. The second volume will be devoted to the Provincial period, with contributions from several of those above-named, and W. F. Poole. The third volume will treat of the Revolutionary period, with papers by Hon. C. F. Adams, Admiral Preble, and others named before; also on the last hundred years, by Henry Cabot Lodge, Gen. F. W. Palfrey, Rev. J. Freeman Clarke, Rev. Philips Brooks, &c. The fourth volume will complete the history of the last hundred years and contain articles on special topics by Josiah P. Quincy, Edward Atkinson, F. B. Perkins, Dr. O. W. Holmes, John S. Dwight, Dr. George Ripley, and many others.

Messrs. Henry C. Lea's Son & Co., Philadelphia, have nearly ready a treatise on Electricity as applied to the Practice of Medicine and Surgery, by Roberts Bartholow, M.D., author of 'Materia Medica.' They have also nearly ready the fourth edition of Dr. Joseph H. Wythes' 'Manual of Microscopy,' very much enlarged, and with upwards of two hundred illustrations.

Lippincott's Magazine for June will contain a new poem by Mr. H. W. Longfellow, entitled 'Old St. David's at Radnor,' with an engraving of the church.

Messrs. Lockwood, Brooks, & Co., Boston, will shortly publish a volume of essays by the late John Weiss, entitled 'Immortal Life.'

Mr. John B. Magurn, Toronto, has just issued parts one and two of the 'Canadian Portrait Gallery,' a work similar in style to 'Cassell's Portrait Gallery.' The work is to contain one hundred portraits of prominent Canadians, and will be completed in thirty parts.

Stoddard has written a new memoir of the poet, also for Mr. Widdleton, as a prefix to a new 'Household' edition; and the May number of *Scribner's Magazine* contained a noteworthy critical study of Edgar Allan Poe and his work in prose and verse, by Edmund Clarence Stedman.

The Rev. William M. Taylor's recent lectures on 'The Gospel Miracles in their relation to Christ and Christianity,' delivered before the students of Princeton Theological Seminary, will shortly be published by A. D. F. Randolph & Co., New York.

Mr. Charles S. Sargent, of Brookline, Mass., Harvard Professor of Arboriculture, has published, in his capacity of Special Agent of the approaching U. S. Census, a 'Catalogue of the Forest Trees of North America,' preliminary to one which will be added to the Census Report on the Forest Wealth of the United States.

Messrs. Charles Scribner's Sons, New York, will publish this month a complete edition in one volume of the Poetical Works of Mr. Richard Henry Stoddard, with portrait. The book will be pleasantly heralded by a paper on this poet and his poetry, from the pen of his friend Mr. Edmund Clarence Stedman, in a forthcoming number of *Scribner's Magazine*.

Messrs. Stern & Co., of Philadelphia, have published a volume entitled 'Eminent Israelites of the Nineteenth Century,' compiled by Henry Samuel Morais.

Mr. R. Worthington, New York, will publish this month an important art book, entitled 'Examples of Household Taste,' by Walter Smith, a fine quarto, fully illustrated with designs.

OBITUARY.

The Rev. John Curwen, the originator of the Tonic Sol Fa movement in England, died on the 26th ult., after a short illness. Mr. Curwen, who was in his 64th year, was educated at Coward College and the London University, and entered the ministry of the Independent denomination in 1838. In 1844 he became the pastor of a congregation at Plaistow, where he developed and promoted the Tonic Sol Fa system of teaching singing invented by Miss Glover, of Norwich. In 1867 Mr. Curwen retired from the ministry owing to ill-health, and established a printing and publishing business in order to extend and promote the Tonic Sol Fa movement. He also projected a Tonic Sol Fa College, towards which a considerable sum of money has been raised. As a writer Mr. Curwen was distinguished for clearness of expression, and his works for musical students are well worthy of the reputation they have gained.

M. Paul de Musset, the poet's elder brother, died on the 18th ult., in Paris, at the age of 76. He began to write historical novels in 1832, brought out two plays in 1856 and 1857 with but little success, and four years ago published a life of his brother, whom he had defended

in 'Lui et Elle' against George Sand's allusion to her rupture with Alfred de Musset in her 'Elle et Lui.'

We have to announce the death of Mr. William Hallows Miller, M.D., F.R.S., who for the long period of 48 years has been Professor of Mineralogy at Cambridge. For some time, owing to the infirmities of age, his professorial duties have been discharged by a deputy appointed by Dr. Miller and approved by the University. The late Professor was born in 1801. He died on the 20th ult. at his residence in Cambridge. Professor Miller was an industrious author. In 1831 he published 'The Elements of Hydrostatics and Hydrodynamics,' a work which has passed through three editions. His 'Elementary Treatise on the Differential Calculus' has reached two editions. In conjunction with Mr. H. J. Brooke, F.R.S., F.G.S., he published a new edition of Mr. Philips's 'Elementary Introduction to Mineralogy,' which was practically rewritten. In the preface to that work, his co-editor says, 'I think it due to Professor Miller to state that nearly the whole of the assistance which I have been able to render consists in such information relating to many of the minerals described as a long acquaintance with them has enabled me to afford, and in having supplied such specimens and crystals as it appeared desirable again to examine and measure. In every other respect the treatise has been composed and arranged entirely by Professor Miller.' In addition to these works the late Professor has been a frequent contributor to the 'Proceedings of the Royal Society,' the *Philosophical Magazine* and other scientific periodicals. His 'Treatise on Crystallography' and his 'Tract on Crystallography' have each contributed greatly to his reputation as a keen and accurate observer.

On the same day on which Professor Miller died, another eminent scientific professor and author, Professor Ansted, passed away at the age of 66. The list of his works is far too long to quote; but among them may be mentioned—besides his contributions to the transactions of learned and scientific societies—his 'Application of Geology to the Arts and Manufactures,' his 'Physical Geography,' his 'Elementary Course of Geology and Mineralogy,' and 'The World we Live in.' He was also an extensive contributor to the 'Dictionary of Science, Literature, and Art.'

From Messrs. W. H. Allen & Co.—'Herat and Great Britain,' by a Persian minister, closes with some interesting words: 'Your scientific frontier was a necessity; hold it, but do not advance beyond it. Do not harass the people who were made to be your natural allies. The supreme struggle is at hand and is inevitable. Victory will be his who has the sympathy and alliance of the intermediate peoples.'

From Messrs. A. C. Armstrong and Son, New York.—Leypoldt and Jones' 'American Catalogue.' The volume is now completed by: I. a key to the abbreviations of publishers' names; II. contributed lists of books published since 1876; III. an index to it of authors and titles, in one alphabet. Nothing can well be handsomer, either in matter or manner.

From the Bazaar Office.—Neison's 'Practical Boat-building for Amateurs,' by D. Kemp. Profusely illustrated with diagrams, this little work should teach boat-building, if that art is to be learnt from a book. Materials, tools, designing; punts, clench-built skiffs, the Rob Roy canoe, sailing-boats, Canadian bateau, canvas canoe, American shooting punt, &c. are among the matters dealt with.

From the same.—'The Bicyclists' Pocket Book and Diary' for 1880, 1881. A pocket tablet diary, with the calendar, notes, record, the 'red letter days' in the history of bicycling, each page having a column for the insertion of the number of miles ridden by its possessor. The contents also include the bugle-calls of the bicyclist in music type; lists of clubs; notes of matches past and to come, and much other information useful to those for whom the pocket-book is designed. A word of praise is due to the handy and convenient form of the book, its rounded edges making it specially suitable for the pocket.

From Messrs. Benham & Co, Colchester.—'Among the Tombs of Colchester.' An interesting contribution to the history of the 'Ancient Monuments' of the city of Colchester, giving the text of the inscriptions in the churchyards and upon the brasses to be found within the churches.

From the 'Family Herald' Office.—The 'Family Herald' Volume 44. In the midst of much literary novelty and activity, there are still a few of the old serials which in form and contents are eminently conservative, and the *Family Herald* is a noteworthy case in point. Looking at the forty-fourth volume, it is almost identical in its general characteristics with the *Family Herald* of days now long gone by, and it is still fairly entitled to the description given on its title page of 'a domestic magazine of useful information and amusement.' Its 'leading article' is still as

it has ever been; 'The Story-teller,' which supplies in every number a tale complete in itself, while in another part of its pages there is a serial work of fiction running on from week to week. But while fiction thus occupies the major part of the *Herald's* pages, there is always a 'moral essay,' or an article on some social question, while the headings of 'Family Matters,' 'Scientific and Useful,' 'Statistics,' 'Varieties,' 'The Riddler,' and 'Random Readings,' afford a multitude of entertaining and instructive annotations. The page devoted 'To Correspondents' gives a large amount of really useful facts, valuable, not only to the individuals whose queries furnish the basis of the notes, but to the readers of the magazine generally.

From Messrs. Griffith & Farran.—'The Bicycle Road Book,' by Charles Spencer. As the battle between the rights of pedestrians and the bicyclists seems to have resulted in a decided victory for the latter, it is not surprising to find that the bicyclist is become an important factor in society, and hence books specially compiled for his use are finding their way to our table. The present volume furnishes a complete guide to the roads of England, Scotland and Wales, with information as to the best hotels, population of the towns, &c., and as the author tells us that he has himself ridden on the modern horse from London to John O'Groats, N.B., he has the qualification of personal experience of the needs of the bicyclist. The book gives an immense number of journeys, with the towns through which the rider must pass *en route*, and in each case the distance from the starting point is given, so that the progress made from point to point may be judged. Although primarily designed for bicyclists, the 'Road Book' will be equally valuable to pedestrians or to those who may adopt any other means of making a tour of their native land.

From 'Hand & Heart' Publishing Office.—'The Forgotten Truth; or, the Gospel of the Holy Ghost, with selected Hymns of the Spirit,' by the Rev. Charles Bullock, B.D. A series of practical expositions of the office and work of the Holy Ghost as the teacher and inspirer of men and the giver of peace and love. Appended to the work, which is written in a thoroughly popular style, is a series of thirty hymns—one for each day in the month—illustrating the Holy Spirit's ministry.

From Messrs. Harper and Brothers, New York. Waring's 'Tyrol and the skirt of the Alps.' The contents comprise: Under the Walzmann, the Pinzgau, Zillerthal, Innsbruck, across the Brenner, the city of the bells (Meran), Grödner Thal, Seisser Alp, portals of the Dolomites, Cortina d'Ampezzo, ascent of Monte Tofana, Mesurina Alp, to the Lagunes, Venice, the Lakes, Vaudois

valleys, higher valleys, &c. The forty or fifty engravings are beautiful examples of woodcut illustration, and make a kind of drawing-room table-book of the work, and an agreeable assemblage of quasi-remembrances to those who have visited the localities. The following will have its interest for English people:—

We found at Flügen, a capital example of the Tyrolean 'Wirth' in Samuel Margreiter, who keeps the Gasthaus zum Stern. Both he and his wife were members of Ludwig Rainer's company of Tyrolean musicians, and in their travels they have acquired a good knowledge of English.

Travellers to Munich may have noticed how that in that city, from its nearness to the Tyrol, Tyrolean minstrels are almost nightly to be heard at one or other of the great beer-drinking places. Even there scepticism is sometimes expressed as to the minstrels being genuine by *Tiroler*. It may, therefore, be some comfort to those who heard Mr. Margreiter and his companions in London and the provinces, to learn that there was 'no deception.' We are tempted to make another short extract:—

At the edge of South-eastern Tyrol, within an area of 40 miles by 30, stand all the great peaks of the Dolomite formation. The region has been known to geologists since Dolomieu at the close of the last century described the mineral which was to bear his name, and identified it with this mountain formation.

Altogether, we have here a capital introduction to an unhackneyed district.

From Messrs. Hodder & Stoughton.—'Hymns for the use of Christian Associations, Evangelistic Services, &c.' New and enlarged edition. A re-issue of a hymn-book originally compiled in 1862 for the use of Young Men's Christian Associations, and subsequently published in a revised form in 1875, under the superintendence of Mr. W. Edwyn Shipton. The present volume has many additions, including some of Dr. Bonar's beautiful hymns.

From the same.—'The Human Body and its Functions,' by H. Sinclair Paterson, M.D. A second series of lectures delivered by Dr. Paterson before the Young Men's Christian Association during the first quarter of the present year. They are intended to form an introduction to the study of physiology, and, while calculated to be of infinite service to those who cannot go further in scientific investigation, they are also well fitted to form the stepping stone to degree researches. The functions of the various parts of the human organism are fully described, and the best means of securing their healthful development are set forth.

From Messrs. W. & A. K. Johnston.—Johnston's 'Natural History.' The object of this little handbook is to give clear and concise information concerning each animal depicted on Messrs. Johnston's large Natural History Plates. The compiler claims to have united scientific accuracy with simplicity of style. We give two examples:—

The Spider, though reviewed (*sic*) with disgust, and often with fear, is a harmless and often a useful creature. He is the exterminator of many small and annoying insects, and the skill and ingenuity he displays are worthy of our consideration.

The Tarantula, or Wolf-spider, is the largest of the European spiders, its length being 14 inches. Found in Italy, Greece, and Texas. Its bite poisonous, still not deadly; curable by means of sweating. Legend says, that the one (*sic*) bitten falls into a mania for dancing. Named after the city of Tarentum, in Italy.

We believe that the name comes from Taranto in Sicily, more obviously the source of tarantella, the name of the dance. *Tarentum*, like *Troja*, *fuit*. Can it be an Englishman who has written this handbook?

From Messrs. Crosby Lockwood & Co.—De

Fivas' 'Grammaire des Grammaires.' An entirely new edition, the forty-fourth, much enlarged and thoroughly revised, so as to correspond with the *Dictionnaire de l'Academie* of which, an edition with considerable modifications was issued in 1877. The alterations and additions result in adding nearly fifty pages to the book, which is sold, nevertheless, at the accustomed price.

From Messrs. Sampson Low, Marston, & Co.—'Hundred Greatest Men' portrait collection. Class V.—History. This portfolio has an introduction by Dean Stanley, at the head of its letter-press. The portraits are—Herodotus, a bust, from Rome; Thucydides, from the Louvre; Demosthenes, from the bust in the Louvre; Cicero, in stipple after a bust formerly in the Duke of Wellington's collection; Tacitus; Plutarch, from an ancient bas-relief; Montaigne, an un-idealised likeness; Montesquieu, a line engraving in the medallion manner; Voltaire, old mezzo-tint engraved; Diderot & Lessing, line engravings; and Gibbon, the only known portrait. Besides these are a young Dante; Milton as a child; and Luther, in death.

From the same.—'Sylvan Spring,' by Francis G. Heath. A crown octavo of 446 pages, in extra binding, decorated with leaves in green and flowers in gold, its own leaves being edged with gold. It has just one hundred wood engravings of the flowers and ferns of spring, leafy head and tail pieces, and coloured figures of no less than thirty-six flowers which belong to spring. These last are chromo-lithographic imitations of drawings by Mr. Hulme, the artist and author of 'Familiar Wild Flowers.' Of the sixteen full-page wood engravings, fourteen are from drawings by Mr. Harrison Weir, Mr. Birket Foster, &c., and among the artists of the drawings for the smaller woodcuts are Messrs. J. C. Horsley, J. Gilbert, &c. At the end is a copious index, itself a long list of birds and flowers, two words which are in themselves almost enough to commend a book which is full of them.

From Messrs. Macniven & Wallace.—'The Man on the Top of the Ark and other Gospel Parables,' by Alex. Macleod Symington. A clever and ingenious attempt to found on Old Testament History some parables teaching Christian doctrines. The man who thought to save himself by climbing to the top of the ark, and refused to seek shelter within, and who, when the flood came, died of hunger and cold, is instanced as an illustration of the folly of those who seek salvation by their own means instead of accepting the way ordained by God. The other parables are drawn from the Brazen Serpent and the Cities of Refuge.

From Mr. Thomas Murby.—'Principles of Agriculture,' by Albert Carey, Head Master of the Board Schools, North Tawton. The object of this work is to supply a text-book on agriculture, expressly adapted to the requirements of the Syllabus of the Science and Art Department, South Kensington. The work is clearly arranged, and affords a practical guide to the treatment of the soil and to the growth of crops and the culture of live stock.

From National Temperance Publication Depot. 'Frank West; or, the Struggles of a Village Lad.' The story of a national school-boy's efforts to rise in the world, his success in the task being accomplished by his initial feat of gaining a place in the local grammar-school at a competitive examination. One of the schemes adopted by the rector

for the improvement of the villagers was the establishment of a reading room, the details of which are worked into the tale. Frank West, having obtained the local scholarship for the University, takes his degree and becomes rector of his native parish.

From the same.—'Katie's Counsel,' and other tales, by a Clergyman's Wife. Some temperance tales, free from extravagance, and marked by what may be termed 'naturalness.'

From Messrs. Nisbet & Co.—'Memorials of Frances Ridley Havergal.' This is a work which will be read with eager interest by many. It is compiled, as the preface informs us, by her sister, Miss Maria V. G. Havergal. Facing the title-page is a portrait of the deceased lady, with a facsimile of her handwriting. The work is partly composed of an autobiography; that is, there are copious selections from a diary, which will have peculiar interest for the numerous readers of Miss Havergal's works. There are also poetical pieces by herself and various writers, memoranda as a basis for prayers, letters from various friends, an account of the Church Missionary Memorial Fund, in *memoriam* pieces from various quarters, and views. Altogether, it is an extremely well-filled volume of about 400 pages, and is sure, we should say, to command an extensive sale.

From Messrs. C. Kegan Paul & Co.—'Health,' by W. H. Corfield, M.A., M.D. (Oxon.), F.R.C.P. The author of this volume, who occupies the post of Professor of Hygiene and Public Health at University College, London, and who is also Medical Officer of Health and Public Analyst for St. George's, Hanover Square, has not only the technical qualifications, but the practical experience, which entitle him to speak with authority on questions of sanitary science. He here gives us, from the shorthand writers' notes, the lectures which he delivered at the rooms of the Society of Arts, under the auspices of the Trades Guild of Learning, and of the National Health Society, and they seem to cover almost the whole ground which ought to be travelled over by those who desire information on the subject. Having laid the basis of his instructions for the preservation of health by dealing with general anatomy, the circulation of the blood, respiration, nutrition, the digestive organs, the nervous system and the organs of the senses. Dr. Corfield proceeds to treat of the health of the individual, and the means of promoting it, and then gives some valuable information in regard to lighting and warming, ventilation, foods and drinks, climate, houses and towns, small-pox, and communicable diseases. The work of the National Health Society in instituting these courses of lectures cannot be too warmly commended, and it is equally satisfactory to find that they are now placed before the general public in an accessible form. To those who as clergymen, vestrymen, or district visitors, are anxious to promote social and sanitary progress, this volume will furnish some invaluable hints, and it might with advantage be publicly read in every parish in the kingdom. We entirely agree with the words of Canon Kingsley, quoted by Dr. Corfield in his opening lecture, that 'Teaching of this kind ought, and will in some more civilised age and country, be held a necessary element in the school course of every child, just as necessary as reading, writing, and arithmetic, for it is, after all, the most necessary branch of that "technical educa-

tion" of which we hear so much just now, named the τέχνη, or art, of keeping one's self alive and well.' To this art Dr. Corfield has, in the volume before us, made an admirable contribution.

From W. Reeves.—Reeves' Music Primers: Biographical Series, No. 1, 'The Life and Works of Mozart,' by Alfred Whittingham.—Having supplied the musical public with some capital translations of standard works, by continental authors, on music and musicians, and with some equally welcome reprints of American works on the art, Mr. Reeves seems to be entering on a new and more adventurous course, by issuing what he describes in old-fashioned style as 'Music Primers,'—a title, by the way, already adopted by Messrs. Novello, Ewer, & Co. In the present little book we have a compressed and concise account of the principal events in Mozart's life, culled chiefly from Oulibicheff's Biography of the Composer, and a short summary of the characteristics of his principal works. Such a little book is well fitted for school use, and as a companion to the concert room for those who, while often listening to the great master's music, know but little of his history.

From Messrs. Smith, Elder, & Co.—'Shakespeare's Knowledge and Use of the Bible,' by C. Wordsworth. This is the third edition of the Bishop of St. Andrews' interesting work, with an appendix containing additional illustrations, and a tercentenary sermon. The book is dedicated 'to my children, in the hope and with the aim that they may grow up readers and lovers of Shakespeare as the book of man; but still more readers and lovers of the Bible as the Word of God.' We do not know that we can add anything more to commend Shakespeare's Knowledge and Use of the Bible to the thoughtful minded.

From the same.—'Selection from the Poetry of Elizabeth Barrett Browning,' second series; Selections from the Poetical works of Robert Browning, second series. They are two poets of such rare quality, that their works are 'caviare to the general.' It is therefore an especial privilege to have collected in one or two smaller caskets so many choice gems as an average reader is likely to have time and attention for. These volumes are the more welcome, that copies of any of Mr. or Mrs. Browning's volumes are seldom met with second-hand; a mercantile testimony, which in certain cases is not without its value. Among the pieces in the selection from Mrs. Browning's poetry, is 'Casa Guidi Windows.' There may be no harm in stating that the house in which Mr. and Mrs. Browning lived was the Casa Guidi, in the Via Maggio, which leads south from the Arno. We believe that the Florentines have placed on it a tablet in memory of the illustrious sojourners among them. Thus begins 'Casa Guidi Windows':—

I heard last night a little child go singing
'Neath Casa Guidi windows, by the church,
O bella liberta, O bella!

Since then we have had Garibaldians and third class passengers singing in the trains, *Roma o la morte!*

From Mr. Edward Stanford.—'The Tourist's Guide to Cornwall and the Scilly Isles,' by Walter H. Tregellas. Second edition. The interest in the West Country which has been created during the past fortnight by the visit of the Prince and Princess of Wales to Truro to assist at the stone-laying of the cathedral will doubtless serve

to increase the number of tourists in the Royal Duke's county during the summer, and to all those who wend their way thither we can commend Stanford's 'guide' as being a capital handbook for the intelligent visitor. The trustworthiness of the book, as far as its geological and scientific information is concerned, is guaranteed by the fact that its author, Mr. Tregellas, is the chief draughtsman at the War Office, and is also a member of the Royal Archaeological Institute of Great Britain and of the Royal Institution of Cornwall, while a cursory inspection by any one who is acquainted with the district will prove that it is well up to date in the matter of local detail. The map of the county is as excellent as are all Mr. Stanford's charts.

From the Sunday School Union.—'Robert Raikes, and his Scholars,' by Mrs. H. B. Paull.—The celebration of the centenary of the establishment of the Sunday School system, is bringing with it a mass of what may, we suppose, be termed 'centenary literature'; and in the little volume before us, which is attractively illustrated, we have a sketch of the work of Robert Raikes, intended for juvenile readers. Mrs. Paull has made the most of the details which have been preserved of the early scholars of the pioneer of the Sunday School system, and she has produced a very interesting and readable little book.

From Messrs. Marcus Ward & Co.—'Joan of Ark, "The Maid,"' by Janet Tuckey. This attractively written sketch of the Maid of Orleans forms one of a series of 'Lives of Men and Women in Action,' published under the title of 'The New Plutarch' by Messrs. Marcus Ward & Co. The authoress has done her work well, and has with much freshness of style and power of description set forth the virtues and the prowess of the warrior girl, whose name will ever be associated with heroic deeds and spotless fame.

Messrs. Sampson Low, Marston, & Co.'s magazines are—*London Society*, with various letterpress and illustration, among which we notice a history of the house of Bright at Rochdale, the Mozarts in England, and a stroll in the Harz, a very pretty paper; *Men of Mark*, containing portraits and notices of Sir R. 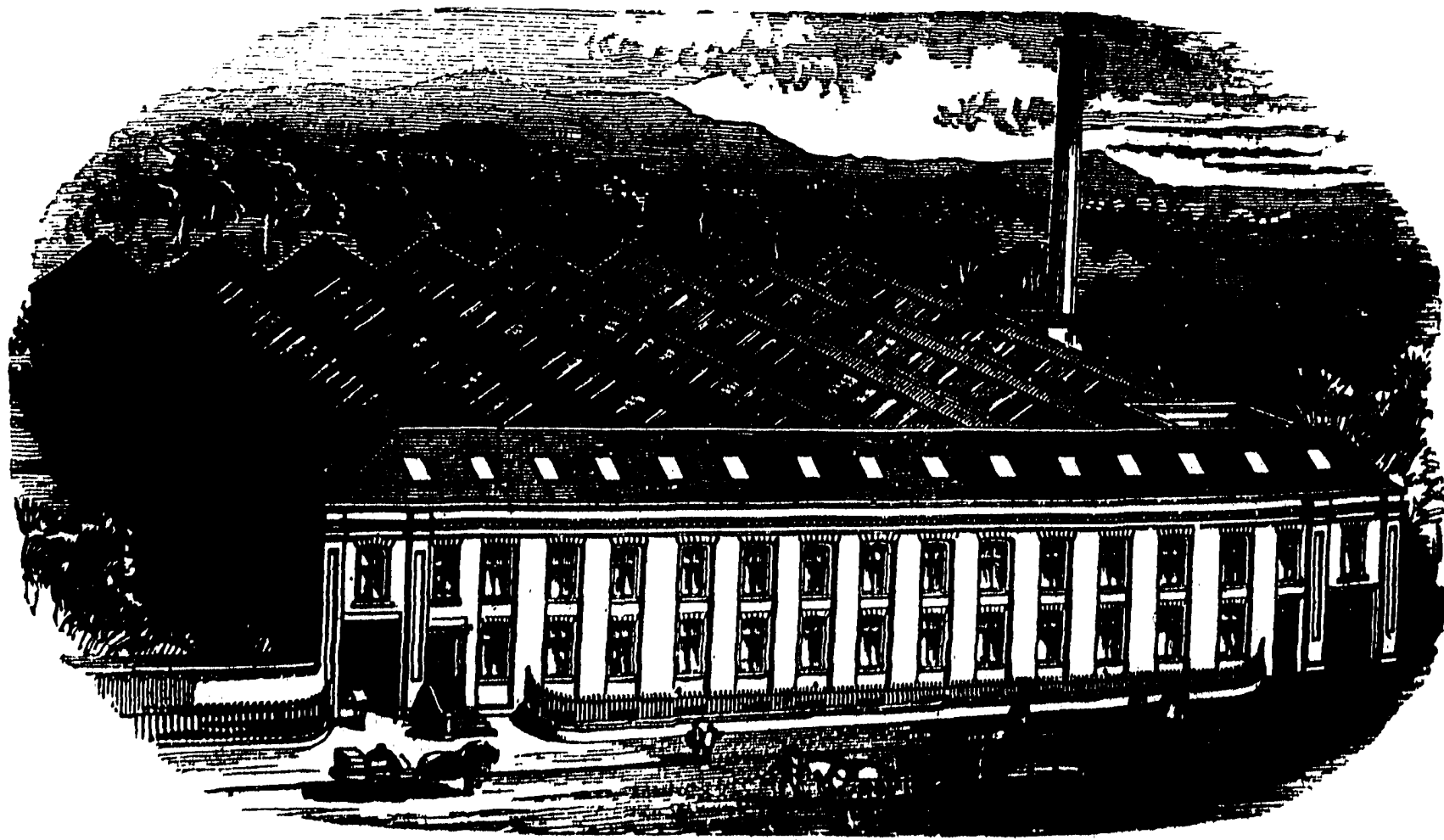
