MR. LOWELL, whose presence in this country as the American Minister at the Court of St. James's has already been fruitful in pleasant evidences of the aminant is court of St. James's has already been fruitful in pleasant evidences of the eminent statesman's goodwill towards English authors and littérateurs, took us at a fair advantage the other day at Edinburgh, by pointing to the hearty greeting which has on several occasions been accorded to English writers across the Atlantic, when they have found it difficult to secure a ready recognition on their own shores. Mr. Lowell more particularly referred to the reception of 'Sartor Resartus,' when it was first collected and published in 1836, in the State of Boston, and was there received with a foreshadowing of the approbation which it afterwards gained in Europe. Mr. Lowell, in proceeding to pass a glowing eulogy upon the veteran author whose name was associated with the toast of the evening ('The Edinburgh Philosophical Institution'), recalled Thackeray's observation that Carlyle was his master, and placed side by side with the great novelist's statement a remark of Mr. Ruskin in a recent number of the Nineteenth Century, in which the professor also ranked himself as one of his disciples. This coincidence, Mr. Lowell justly urged, remembering the wide difference between Ruskin and Thackeray, showed the universality of Carlyle's influence, and proved that he possessed the greatest gift of genius-he approached men on different sides, and reached the intellects and hearts of a great variety of men of different nations. In defining Carlyle's distinguishing characteristic Mr. Lowell declared it to be 'the surprising gift of expressing poetic thought in prose.'

Mr. Murray's annual trade sale demonstrates one fact at least—that the selling of books is not at an end. The figures are wonderful. The following were the numbers of other books sold: 2,200 Miss Bird's 'Japan,' 2 vols.; 600 Canon Barry's 'Boyle Lectures'; 500 Brugsch's 'Egypt,' 2 vols.; 800 Darwin on the 'Movement in Plants;' 500 Lady Eastlake's 'Sketch of the late Mrs. Grote'; 600 Dr. Schliemann's 'Ilios'; 400 'Life and Times of Madame de Staël,' 2 vols.; 1,100 Sir Edward Reed's 'Japan,' 2 vols.; 800 Smiles' 'Huguenots in England and Ireland,' new edition ; 400 Hayward's 'Eminent Statesmen and Writers,' 2 vols. ; 800 Blaikie's 'Personal Life of Dr. Livingstone'; 400 Murray's 'History of Greek Sculpture'; 800 Dean Stanley's 'Christian Institutions;' 500 'Life of Lord Chancellor Campbell,' 2 vols. ; 750 Jennings' 'Rambles among the Hills'; 400 Seebohm's 'North Siberia'; 400 Burbidge's 'Gardens of the Sun.' Standard works: 600 Childs' 'Benedicite'; 2,200 Dr. Smith's 'Biblical Dictionaries'; 2,060 Dr. Smith's 'Classical Dictionaries'; 600 Lyell's 'Geology'; 1,000 Newth's 'Natural Philosophy'; 2,200 Stanley's 'Historical Works'; 1,500 Grote's 'Greece'; 1,000 Milman's 'Histories'; 900 Murray's 'British Classics'; 8,000 Murray's 'Student's Manuals'; 7,000 Dr. Smith's 'Smaller Histories'; 500 Motley's 'Netherlands'; 1,000 Canon Robertson's 'Christian Church.' The aggregate is the sale of considerably over a hundred thousand volumes of the highest class, besides that some of them are also, as especially Dr. Schliemann's 'Ilios,' exceptionally handsome That such business should be transacted over an almost social table, in a less time than ones. three hours—a 'return' which any house might be proud of achieved thus—is surely a me-

The recent gathering of the British Archæological Association included visits to the British Museum and Gray's Inn, which gave the most complete satisfaction to the country In the book department of the Museum, Mr. George Bullen, the able and courteous members. Keeper of the Printed Books, received the party, and, with the aid of several of his officers, took the visitors through the noble library, known as the Music Room and the King's Gallery, pointing out some of the choicest books and producing many of them for their closer inspection as they passed through. The magnificent first-known printed book, the work of Guttenberg, a folio Bible in Latin, and said to be worth upwards of £3,000, was particularly regarded, as was also the famous first quarto edition of 'Hamlet,' dated 1603, which was purchased from Mr. Halliwell's collection, with other Shakespearean rarities, when that gentleman had printed his folio edition of Shakespeare's plays, besides many other books of great value and world-wide renown. The MS. Department was next visited, and there Mr. E. Maunde Thompson, one of the vice-presidents of the association, took great pains to explain the interest attaching to the fine collection of MSS. and missals he had kindly arranged on tables for the examination of the party. At Gray's Inn, in the absence of the Rev. In the Alexander Taylor, the visitors were received by the librarian, Mr. Douthwaite. library several rare books were examined, one a small 4to. of the 'Maske of Flowers,' dated 1613, causing much interest by its having the music printed in it as well as the words set to it.

The Art Journal, as we have already announced, is about to enter on a new phase of its history, and, on resigning the editorship, Mr. S. C. Hall has written 'some words of farewell' on his retirement from the direction of the Journal which he commenced forty-two years ago. After giving an account of the state of art when he began his work, of the history of the Journal, and of the success which it attained, Mr. Hall says :— 'I do not think the history of literature

supplies a parallel case—that of an editor commencing a publication, continuing to edit it during forty-two years, and retiring from it when it had attained vigorous age—its value augmented, and not deteriorated by time.' Mr. Hall concludes his interesting address thus :—'I humbly, earnestly, and gratefully thank the public by whom I have been so long supported; the artists, by so many of whom I have been generously and zealously aided; the art patrons, who collections have so continually ministered to my needs; the manufacturers who so frequently acknowledged a debt for assistance rendered. To all my fellow-workers for art of the contemporary Press; to the numerous friends who have been my constant and unfailing encouragers and helpers; to the proprietors of the Art Journal, who for more than thirty years have reposed in me the confidence that has continued to the end—to each and all I bid a respectful, an earnest, a grateful, and an affectionate farewell.'

Professor Henry Morley, in an address just delivered at the Westbourne Park Institute as one of a course of lectures on 'The Literature of the Present Time in its Relation to the Work of the Day,' referred to the works of Dickens and Thackeray. He described both novelists as the chief leaders and workers in their day, and then, separating the two, he gave a vivid and interesting sketch of the character, life, and work of Dickens, tracing the great novelist as a worker in early life as a journalist, in the sense that he was a working reporter, skilled in all the technicalities of his art ; then the several positions which Dickens held at one and the same time, of a novelist, writing for the amusement and instruction of his fellowcreatures ; as an administrative journalist, in the sense of being the manager and director of a paper and periodicals, and as a man of business. The character which the lecturer gave Dickens was that he was most punctilious in the discharge of all the duties connected with the journals, entering into all details, and seeing the papers to press with the utmost care, and that his engagements were always scrupulously kept. The lecturer touched upon the charge which was made against Dickens—the 'want of culture 'shown in his works—and remarked that the genius which had overcome this lack stood out in consequence the more brilliantly.

Among the more prominent of the various libraries are the Bibliothèque Nationale of Paris, with 2,078,000 vols., and 86,000 MSS.; the Royal Library at Munich, with 800,000 vols., and 24,000 MSS.; of Berlin, with 700,000 vols., and 15,000 MSS.; of Dresden, with 500,000 vols.; of Vienna, with 420,000; of Copenhagen, 410,000. Paris itself possesses some very large libraries apart from the Nationale, viz., that of the Arsenal, 180,000; Mazarine Library, 150,000; the Institute, 80,000; the City of Paris Library, 52,000; while in the provinces are the libraries of Amiens, 42,000; Versailles, 41,000; Mans, 41,000; Montpelier, 40,500; Cambrai, 30,000; Toulouse, 30,000.

Messrs. Ellis & White announce for publication a 'History of the Family of Fortescue in all its Branches,' by Thomas (Fortescue), Lord Clermont, with forty-two portraits, engravings, monuments, &c. Royal 4to. Second edition. The first edition was printed exclusively for private circulation.

Messrs. Hodder & Stoughton have just completed arrangements with the American publishers for an English edition of a new and deeply interesting work by John B. Gough, the eminent temperance orator, to appear simultaneously in England and America, about Christmas. The work will be entitled 'Sunlight and Shadow ; or, Gleanings from my Life-Work,' comprising personal experiences, anecdotes, incidents, and reminiscences, gathered from thirty-seven years' experience on the platform and among the people at home and abroad. It will be illustrated.

The committee of the Topographical Society of London have fixed the annual subscription to the Society at a guinea. The publications of the Society in its first year will probably be—(1) a portion of Vanden Wyngaerde's View of London, dated about A.D. 1550, from the Bodleian Library, Oxford—the earliest known plan of London; (2) the Map of London in the time of Queen Elizabeth, by Braun and Hogenberg; (3) Norden's Map of Middlesex, showing those rural districts which now form part of the great metropolis as they were in Queen Elizabeth's reign; and (4) a volume of extracts from calendars of state papers, historical manuscripts, commission reports, &c., relating to London during the same period.

The preparation of a new Bibliographia Cambrensis will form an important item in the programme of the ensuing season's work of the Society of Cymmrodorion.

The revisers of the Authorised Version of the New Testament have at last closed their labours, and on Thursday met for their 103rd and last session in the Jerusalem Chamber. The company has sat 407 days, and the average attendance has been 16 hours on each day of meeting.

Mr. G. Rivers, of 4 Queen's Head Passage, Paternoster Row, sends us his new catalogue of miscellaneous books, extending to 68 pages 8vo., the leading feature of which is books on India and Australia.

Anyone who said of a free library catalogue that it was a work of permanent bibliographic interest, and that lovers of English literature, not musty Dryasdusts, would value it as long as there are books to value, might justly be suspected of extravagance. The librarian of the central lending department of the Newcastle Public Libraries has just sent us a volume which, we think, is not inaptly characterised as above. It is a royal octavo of over 300 pages, dou ble columns, printed in brevier, relieved by the smaller type of subsidiary matter. It sounds like romancing when we state that the smaller type entries include the contents of the 'Edinburgh ' and ' Quarterly' Reviews from the beginning, of 'Blackwood,' 'Fraser,' 'Chambers's Journal,' of 'Bohn's Standard Library,' and of each volume in it; of Bohn's classical and other libraries in like manner; of the 'Contemporary Review,' of the 'Fortnightly,' of the 'Nineteenth Century,' and many similar publications. And, under subjects, are indicated articles as well as books which deal with them. Where else, for a shilling, will you get such aid ? if, indeed, it be purchaseable. Mr. Haggerston may be congratulated on the service which his enthusiasm in a good cause has led him to perform.

Messrs. Eyre & Spottiswoode have shown us some of their novelties in manufacture for the season. Among them are numerous varieties of letter cases of the best calf work, which are ornamented by paintings done by hand, floral subjects, marine views, landscape, lake scenery, Alpine scenes, &c., the leather being of various tints. Wallets there are, also, painted as described, likewise purses with rims. These articles are done especially for Christmas and the New Year, with winter scenes and words of greeting. The latter can, if desired, be had without greetings, or special greetings will be inserted to order. We are aware that handpainted goods are not a new idea, but we believe that artistic designs such as those employed here are a novelty in the trade. One feature of these coloured pictures may be named—that, extending over the flaps, a complete picture has been ingeniously contrived whether the article is open or shut, so that one article has really two pictures on its side. Another novelty we must not forget to name—plush albums and rough calf bindings.

The Rev. Cunningham Geikie, D.D., has just issued a new work, 'Hours with the Bible,' which is published by Messrs. S. W. Partridge & Co., from whom his other books can be had. See advertisement, page 1023.

Messrs. Peacock, Mansfield, & Britton send us their trade list of diaries for 1881. Among the new articles which we have seen are a green morocco diary, about  $3\frac{1}{2}$  inches by  $2\frac{1}{4}$ , delicately gilt, the edges gilt, with silk lining and cover for the book inside; a black leather diary, about  $4\frac{3}{4}$  by  $3\frac{1}{4}$  inches, with four calf-lined pockets and a silk cover for the book; a dainty russia pocket-book and diary, about 4 inches by  $2\frac{1}{2}$ , with four pockets lined with fawn-coloured or drab calf, and silk for the diary. Simplicity and excellence may be called the characteristics of Messrs. Peacock and Mansfield's work, of which the articles before us are an example.

The Dutch Central Committee formed for the erection of a monument to Spinoza passed a resolution, when dissolving itself, that the balance remaining to the credit of the undertaking after all expenses had been defrayed should be devoted to the publication of a new and thoroughly complete edition of Spinoza's works. M. van Bloten and Professor Land were intrusted with the task, and a communication is being addressed to all librarians throughout the world, asking information about manuscripts or autographs which they may have in charge, in order to make the new edition as perfect as possible. The work is to be published by Nijhoff, at the Hague. The publisher Quantin has just issued a work well worthy of the attention of admirers of Rembrandt, more numerous in England than anywhere else. This new work, 'Les Œuvres Complètes de Rembrandt,' has been compiled under the direction of M. Charles Blanc, formerly of the Ecole des Beaux Arts, and whose authority in matters of art is well known. The book consists of heliographic reproductions of Rembrandt's engravings. The collection has been made from the museums of Amsterdam, Paris, London, Oxford, Cambridge, Haarlem, Berlin, Dresden, and Vienna, which had all to be visited for the purpose. The letterpress of the two volumes has been for thirty years a chief subject of M. Charles Blanc's studies. The result has been a great success. Only 500 copies have been printed. A bookseller's notice informing the Parisian public that M. Gambetta's principal speeches are in the press and will appear shortly has given rise to the idea that M. Gambetta intends standing at the next opportunity as a candidate for the Academy, an idea which has sufficed to produce animated comments. It need scarcely be said that very few of the persons who discuss this hypothesis pay attention to the claims the future candidate possesses by virtue of his literary qualities, and that political feelings alone supply the arguments alike of the partisans and adversaries of his candidacy. Our monthly contemporary, the Artist, which is nearly at the close of its first year, has fully kept up its interest and extended its comprehensiveness. Amongst its recent features are a quarterly review of the Fashions as a form of Art, and a 'Ladies' Art Column,' specially edited by the Hon. Mrs. Armytage. With the new year the Artist will take the second title of a 'Journal of Home Culture.' The total number of visitors to the Guildhall Library, Reading Room, and Museum during the past month was 32,713, showing an increase of 470 readers and 281 visitors to the museum on the number during the same period last year.

The promised improvements in the arrangements at the Vatican Library are now being actively carried out by the newly-appointed librarian, Monsignor Ciccolini. The following arrangements have already been made by him :--In the outer reading-room are placed a collection of dictionaries and books of reference, catalogues of foreign libraries, and collections that will be of much service to students. It is to be hoped that English as well as foreign libraries will send copies of their catalogues and indices of MSS. to complete the list, which is at present not as full as it could be made, for the benefit of the numerous readers of their respective countries who make constant use of the Vatican Museum. New tables and convenient seats have been substituted for the old and awkwardly-planned desks, at which it was difficult to stand, and impossible to sit until one had deprived one's neighbours of their share of the leather cushions. Arrangements have also been made, which will shortly be carried out, by which additional light will be brought into the room by means of a window to be opened above the door of entrance, which will be lighted by a lantern over the space between the outer and inner rooms. The catalogues of MSS. and printed books are in progress (it may not be generally supposed that there are about 200,000 printed volumes in the rooms known as the Appartamento Borgia), and in compiling them it is not improbable that several buried treasures will be brought to light. The Archives, also, which have hitherto been accessible only to a very few privileged persons, will be now opened to students in general. The entrance to the rooms in the Archives will be in future from a door opening into the street, instead of going through the reading-room of the library and a part of the galleries.

'The Church of the Future' is the title bestowed by the Archbishop of Canterbury on his Charges just published by Messrs. Macmillan.

The collection of books and MSS. which Messrs. Puttick and Simpson will sell to-morrow and on following days at their house in Leicester Square will include a copy of the first edition of Shelley's 'Queen Mab,' with annotations stated to be by Mrs. Shelley. The work will doubtless be anxiously scanned by bibliophiles.

The Christmas number of All the Year Round, entitled 'Over the Sea with the Sailor,' comes as of recent years from the joint hands of Messrs. Besant and Rice.

Messrs. Marcus Ward & Co. have issued a two-shilling edition of 'The Child's Life of Our Lord.'

'Suggestive Thoughts on Religious Subjects' is the title of another of Mr. Southgate's compilations, just published by Messrs. Charles Griffin & Co.

Messrs. Bradbury, Agnew, & Co. announce for publication to-day a volume of Charles Keene's sketches from *Punch* of 'Our People.'

The Archbishop of Canterbury has, with the concurrence of the Ecclesiastical Commissioners, lately made the Lambeth Library still more accessible to the public, especially by allowing books to be borrowed by the clergy and laity of the diocese, and by others properly recommended, residing in the parishes of Lambeth, Southwark, and Westminster. The library, open daily (Saturdays excepted), is now rendered of even national importance by the increased facilities thus given. The records of the see of Canterbury are of the highest value, the more so as they contain a vast collection of early wills and other documents. The printed rarities are of great worth to the connoisseur, and there are other volumes both of literary and artistic merit. A collection of pamphlets on the monastic buildings of England is being formed, and contributions are asked for this object. Dr. Schliemann's new work, 'Ilios,' which Mr. Murray will publish before long, will be enriched with appendices and notes by Professor Virchow, Brugsch Bey, Professor Sayce, Professor Max Müller, Professor Mahaffy, Professor Ascherson, Mr. Calvert, and Mr. Duffield. A stained-glass window, in three parts, to the memory of the late Mr. Mark Lemon, has just been placed in the aisle of Crawley Church. In addition to various texts round the borders, the following inscription is placed at the foot of the memorial :-- 'To the glory of God, and in memory of Mark Lemon, who died May 25, 1870, these three lights are placed by his family.'

#### OBITUARY.

We hear with regret of the death of Lydia Maria Child, which occurred in Wayland, Mass., on Oct. 20. As the author of 'The American Frugal Housewife,' her name was familiar throughout the United States. Mrs. Child was born in Medford, Mass., on Feb. 11, 1802. As she approached the age of maturity she developed strong literary tastes, and amused her schoolmates with her juvenile stories. Her first book was published in 1824. It was called 'Hobomok; an Indian Story,' and was followed in the ensuing year by a second work, entitled 'The Rebels ; a Tale of the Revolution.' The scene was laid in Massachusetts, and many of the characters were the historical men of the period. In 1826 Mrs. Child began the publication of a monthly magazine called the 'Juvenile Miscellany,' and continued at its head for eight years. In 1831 she published two popular works, called 'The Girl's Own Book' and 'The Mother's Book,' both of which are said to hold places in nearly every New England family library. When the anti-slavery movement began in Boston, Mrs. Child became identified with it, and published a work called 'Appeal in Behalf of that Class of Americans called Africans,' in which she advocated the emancipation of the slaves. In 1841 she removed to New York, and assumed the editorial chair of the 'National Anti-Slavery Standard.' She remained in charge of that paper two years. She also published a work entitled the 'History of Women in all Ages and Nations,' in 1845, 'Biographies of Good Wives,' in 1846, and several juvenile works. Among her other published works are 'Life of Isaac T. Hopper,' 'Progress of Religious Ideas,' Autumnal Leaves,' Looking toward Sunset,' 'The Freedman's Book,' and 'A Romance of the Republic.'

The death is just announced, in his 58th year, of Herr Emil Palleske, a man who leaves behind no inconsiderable fame in Germany as the biographer of Schiller, and as a public reader and lecturer on Shakspeare, Fritz Řeuter, and other popular poets. Born of humble Pomeranian parents at Tempelburg in 1823, Palleske first came before the public as an actor at Posen, and later on, at the instance of Stahr, the deceased husband of Fanny Lewald (the only living lady novelist almost of whom Germany can boast), he removed to Oldenburg, where, from acting plays, he took to writing them, and thus committed a graver error. Discovering it, however, in time, he hastened to retrieve his reputation by giving public recitations from the poets, and, being possessed of a fine voice and person, he soon achieved great success. On the appearance of Mr. Lewes's 'Biography of Goethe,' which excited no less the admiration than the jealousy of bookmakers in Germany, Palleske was instigated by a Berlin publisher to do for Schiller what a foreigner, to the shame of all patriotic Germans, had accomplished, for his greater companion in glory. And there are some who even think, or, at least assert, that the pupil outstripped the master, despite the maxim which maintains that Nature abhorreth duplicates, and the teaching of history, which shows that no great original work of art has ever been excelled by its copy. Palleske, who was further the author of a treatise on the art of public reading and lecturing, had reently been living in retirement at Thal, near Eisenach.

- From Messrs. Bailliere & Co.—Fothergill's (J.M.) 'Aids to Diagnosis, part I.' semeiology, designed for students preparing for examinations. The signs which a patient's whole frame offer to the observing diagnoser, are here noted; how the kind of hair, how the ears, the shape of the forehead, the respiration in relation to the pulse \_\_not the pulse alone—all tell something, or give warning. A very curious little book.
- From the Bazaar Office.- 'The Plum: its History, Varieties, Cultivation, and Disease.' By D. T. Fish. An illustrated guide to the cultivation of the Plum, prefaced by an interesting historical sketch of the popular fruit-tree and a description of its chief varieties as grown in various countries. As regards productiveness and as a source of revenue to the fruit cultivator, the author maintains that plum culture pays as well as, or better than, any other garden crop, the yield per acre for plums having been estimated as averaging £50 per annum. The illustrations are admirably executed, and the directions for planting and tending are as excellent as in the similar volumes from the 'Bazaar' Office which we have previously noticed.
- From Messrs. Bell & Sons.—Ewing's 'We and the World: a Tale for Boys.' An interesting narrative of supposed life in a counting-house, and then at sea, made still more attractive by tinted plates or engravings. One shows the young fellow making his first trial at 'going aloft,' barefooted, which is the mode among sailors, especially in warm climates. We may note that one of the hands is made to answer 'Aye aye, Sir!' when called. This answer is only made when an order to do something is given, to show it is understood. The volume is tastily bound, and has a dedication in which a well-known name is introduced.
- From the Church of England Sunday School Institute.—'Reasons for Believing in Christianity.' By the Rev. C. A. Row, M.A., Prebendary of St. Paul's. The papers contained in this volume were originally read as a course of lectures, delivered at St. Paul's Cathedral to what the author terms 'busy people,' a category in which in all probability" the majority of our

- From the same.—' First Thoughts: being a Text and Commentary for every day in the Christian Year.' New edition. A variety of the birthday book or diary, giving on each left-hand page a text from the Bible with a short meditative comment, and on the right hand a page ruled for manuscript. The comments are selected from the writings of well-known divines, but in the note in which the author acknowledges his indebtedness to various authors, we see that he still describes the Bishop of Bedford as 'the Rev. Walsham How,' a *lapsus pennæ* which he may be glad to have pointed out.
- From the same.—'Bethlehem to Olivet,' a course of lessons on the life of Jesus Christ. By John Palmer. Notes of Sunday School Lessons so arranged as to enable the same subject to be dealt with on a graduated system in all the classes from the most advanced down to the most elementary. The notes, while brief, omit few points which require explanation, and the questions appended to the lessons are well calculated to enable the teacher to test the children's progress and to create an intelligent interest in the subject. Lesson papers to be used by the children, giving the questions and blank space for the answers, are issued to accompany the book.
- From Messrs. Diprose & Bateman.—' Diprose's Annual for 1881.' The writers of this varied and attractive budget of tales and sketches include James Greenwood, W. C. Bennett, and Hawley Smart; and the general design of the work is, in the editor's words, to exhibit 'not caricatures of individuals, but representatives of classes; and therefore nobody need wear one of the caps unless he chooses, however perfectly it may fit. A sketch of the Gladstone family, and of the Premier in particular, finds a place in the Annual.
- From Messrs. Griffith & Farran.—'Julia Maitland,' by Mary and Elizabeth Kirby; 'Lucy's Campaign,' by Mary and Catherine Lee; 'Harry at School,' by Emilia Marryat; 'Grandmama's Relics,' by C. E. Bowen; 'Holiday Tales,' by Florence Wilford. These volumes, all brightly bound and illustrated, may be safely ordered, either as Sunday-school prizes, or to form a little

From the same .- 'Heroes of History and Legend,' by A. W. Grube, translated from the German by John Lancelot Shadwell. A work which has not, as far as we know, any actual counterpart in English literature, and it comes to us therefore as a bond fide addition to our store of useful works for educational and home use. The translation was, we are told, undertaken at the request of Dr. T. R. Armitage, chairman of the British and Foreign Blind Association, in order to provide in a popular form a brief outline of European history to be embossed for the use of the blind. While no one will grudge Dr. Armitage's friends the book which he has, the translator says, compared with the original, and revised throughout, we are glad that an edition has been provided in ordinary typography, for it is a most interesting and valuable work, and its popularity in Germany may be accepted as a guarantee of its intrinsic merits.

From the same.— 'The Nursery Companion,' 'Fragments of Knowledge for Little Folk,' 'The Picturesque Primer,' 'Easy Reading for Little

Readers.' These books give, in separate parts, 'The Favourite Picture Book,' which, in its complete form, proved to be one of the most popular nursery books issued last year by Messrs. Griffith and Farran. 'The Nursery Companion' introduces the young reader to 'Old Mother Hubbard,' 'Cinderella,' 'Puss in Boots,' and other favourite nursery tales told in verse, each stanza having its woodcut. 'Fragments of Knowledge for Little Folk' tells in pleasant rhymes of the chief features of the months, the history of a loaf from the seed to the oven, of a cup of tea from its first stage to its last, of a pound of sugar from the cane to the tub, of a scuttle of coals, and other common objects, and then, after a few pages of pictures of what may be termed proverbs in practice, each golden rule being illustrated by a picture in which it is carried into exercise, there are 'Talks about some Birds and Beasts,' capitally written. 'The Picturesque Primer' gives first a picture alphabet, then a key to telling time from the clock face, two pages from common objects, each illustrated, and then 'Uncle Charlie' rewards the young reader with a budget of nursery rhymes with illustrations, which, when not picturesque, are at least grotesque. 'Easy Reading for Little Readers' finishes the set which was, we believe, prepared by Mr. Charles Welsh, on whom it reflects very considerable credit, for he has contrived to combine amusement and instruction with a success not often achieved in the domain of purely nursery literature.

From Messrs. Hamilton, Adams, & Co.- 'The Teacher's Work: What it is, and How to do it,' by John Palmer. New and revised edition. We have on several occasions welcomed the editions of this useful manual by the Secretary of the Church of England Sunday School Institute as they have passed through the press, and all that remains to be said in the present case is that the value of the book is increased by the revision which its author has once more given to it. The chief recommendations of the manual are that it combines in a singular degree the fullest technical details with a genuine religiousness of aim and tone. From Mr. John Heywood.—'Health Lectures, delivered in March 1878–79–80.' The fruit of the labours of the Manchester and Salford Sanitary Association is here placed within reach of all who choose to pluck it; and readings from the lectures would be most serviceable in towns where the people have not enjoyed the advantage of addresses from their authors. The subjects include the majority of sanitary topics on which it is essential that the public mind should be informed, and although they are dealt with by scientific men they are popularly explained, and are full of common-sense directions for preservation of health and the avoidance of disease. From the same .-- ' The Scholar's History of England,' by J. S. Horn. New edition. A brief but compendious history of England, arranged in paragraphs, and brought down to the close of the Zulu war in the year 1879. Whether it is strictly a matter of fact to assert that 'in 1878 war declared by England against Afghanistan, which after a short campaign resulted in an easy victory for our troops,' is, however, a matter over which, perhaps, Sir Frederick Roberts might be disposed to differ from the author.

- From Messrs. Longmans, Green, & Co.-'Blues and Buffs: a Contested Election and its Results.' This reprint from Fraser's Magazine bears the name of Arthur Mills as its author, and there was, as our readers may remember, in the last parliament, a Mr. Arthur Mills who was member for Exeter, but who failed to secure re-election in the recent general contest. In a prefatory note the author states that the period of his story is antecedent to the changes in our electoral system effected by the Ballot Act eight years ago; but he adds the pungent observation: ' It would appear, however, from recent disclosures before the judges appointed to try certain election petitions, that constituencies bearing some slight resemblance to the typical borough described in these pages still survive.' The story opens with a scene in the House of Commons, which brings

The introduction to this section is by Mr. J. A. Froude, whence we may safely conclude before turning a leaf, that the 'noblest Roman of them all' has an honoured place. First, we have a table of the most celebrated kings, warriors, ministers and popular leaders whom the world has seen. Then a list of the portraits which, with their descriptive letterpress, form the seventh volume of the They are Pericles, hundred greatest men. Alexander, Hannibal, Cæsar, Charlemagne, Alfred the Great, William the Conqueror, Charles V., William the Silent, Richelieu, Cromwell, Peter the Great, Frederick the Great, Washington, Nelson, and Napoleon. The idea of bringing into one focus all that is pictorially or otherwise known about an illustrious man is very interesting. In the case of Cromwell's portrait, here seen, we hope it is more true than the exquisitely disagreeable likenesses or unlikenesses of the shop windows. Frederick the Great and Washington are surely a little idealised.
- From the same.—.' The Iron Gate, and other Poems,' by Oliver Wendell Holmes. A handsomely got-up small octavo volume which contains nineteen

- From the same.—' Workers at Home.' By Mrs. W. H. Wigley. A book of womanly counsels for women on home work and home duties, bearing evident marks of a domestic experience, in which the advice here given has been tested and acted upon. The plan of the work, which seems eminently fitted to be useful in a day when the laity as well as the clergy are being stimulated on all sides to undertake the office of preaching, is to give in alphabetical order notes on a variety of subjects calculated to serve as the basis of sermons or One great advantage of such a addresses. preacher's repertorium as this is that it would, if properly used, enable public teachers to acquire the habit of giving extempore addresses; but even those who still prefer to write their discourses will find here very much that will assist them, and to busy men engrossed in parish work the ready-to-hand provision of sermons in brief will be most valuable. A volume of the publishers' 'Household Library of Exposition,' the object of which is stated to be 'to place within the hands of the general public the best results of Biblical study, expressed in a fresh and readable form, and with direct evangelical application.' The authors engaged on the series include some well-known Scotch divines, and some eminent English Nonconformists. In the present volume we have a series of lectures on the lives of the three patriarchs.

From Messrs. James Nisbet & Co.—' In Christo, or the Monogram of St. Paul.' By J. R. Macduff, D.D. Taking the phrase 'In Christ' as a striking characteristic of St. Paul's writings, where it occurs no fewer than thirty-three times, Dr. Macduff uses it as a subject for a series of meditations on the spiritual life as suggested by the Apostle in this expression, which he terms the 'cor cordium of his writings, the one master-chord which vibrates and pulsates through the whole divine symphony, recalling as an Old Testament parallel the watchword of the Great Elijah— 'Jehovah liveth.' The idea of thus treating Edmund Fowle. A new edition, entirely rewritten and re-arranged, of a little book, the merits of which are guaranteed by the fact that it was originally published by the Church of England Sunday School Institute, and was for many years on the list of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge. The book is written with a good deal of descriptive power, and as it deals with the byepaths of Bible history it travels over ground which has not been completely traversed.
- From Messrs. S. W. Silver & Co.—, Silver & Co.'s 'Handbook for Australia and New Zealand' (including also the Fiji Islands), with new map of the colonies. Third edition. An exhaustive political and geographical guide to the Australian colonies, chiefly designed for the use of emigrants. The handbook supplies every detail as the history

of the settlements, their climate, geology, botany, zoology, government, population, systems of education, religious bodies, agricultural and mining characteristics, land laws, rates of wages, and other matters on which information is likely to be useful to emigrants. The book is so complete that it would be difficult to find a point in its pages open to criticism.

- From Mr. Walter Smith.—'The Consolations of the Christian Seasons.' Part I.: Advent to Easter. By George Edward Jelf, M.A., Canon of Rochester and Vicar of Saffron Walden. A volume of meditations on the teachings of the various Sundays and seasons of the Christian year, as observed by the Church, so treated as to afford comfort and consolation to 'anxious and militant souls.' The tone of the book is that of the Anglican school of divines, and its language is characterised by the utmost simplicity and sobriety.
- From Mr. W. Stevens.—'From Gloom to Sunlight.' This is the new volume of the 'Family Story-Teller,' by the author of the 'Love that Lives.' It is a crown octavo of 222 pages in a stiff cover.
- From Mr. Elliot Stock.—E. Garbett's 'Morning, Noon, and Night.' A pocket manual of private prayer, 18mo. size, with meditations on selected passages of Scripture, and prayers for special occasions.
- From Messrs. Sweeting & Co.—' Selected Readings,' part I. These are pieces of the most eminent authors specially arranged and printed for professional elocutionists, public readers, and members of literary institutions, edited by J. C. L. The point appears to be that the chosen extracts or pieces are printed in an unusually large type, indeed, very like that used for Prayer-books or Bibles which are prepared for the reading-desk; a very happy notion, we think. One of the extracts is the poor clerk's lament from Punch, on his lot generally. If it be permitted to think seriously of a wail in the pages of a comic paper, we should say that a clork, who, according to his own account, only 'fetches' 20s. a week after 20 years' experience and service in one house of business, must be-worth twenty shillings a week.

The other books which we welcome now are Gray Beattie, and Collins, in one volume, with illustrations; Gibbon's Autobiography, Letters, and Crusades, one volume with indexes; and Gems of National (*i.e.* English) poetry, classified, with index. The editing seems carefully done.
