WE are glad to see that the Athenæum stigmatises, in terms which are not a whit stronger than the justice of the case demands, the conduct of the Congress of the United States towards English authors in the matter of copyright. 'They are,' our contemporary affirms, the only body of men with whom the Congress has hitherto manifested no sympathy,' and the writer proceeds to contrast the removal of the disability under which British inventors laboured until the year 1870, of having to pay 500 dollars for a patent when 'any other foreigner' only paid 300, with the refusal of common justice to English authors, which is still persisted in. The Athenæum rightly argues that the British author has at least as strong claims to consideration as the British inventor; but we fear that he is taking too rosy a view of the possibilities of a change in the composition of Congress when he looks forward to its becoming sufficiently enlightened to deal in the same spirit with the author. The main point for hope in the matter seems to lie in the possibility of a change of attitude upon the question on the part of General Garfield's Government, for until his officials are interviewed as to their inten-

tions no certainty can be felt as to the issue of the present controversy. The action of the New York publishers in their anxiety to retain profits which they find their own brethren in the Eastern States are beginning to share with them may possibly lead to some equitable arrangement; but in any case it is to be hoped that sufficient pressure will be brought to bear upon our own Government to prevent it from lending its sanction to such a scheme as has recently been proposed, which could only have been conceived in the interests of the American trade. As far as English authors are concerned, it may be, and indeed unfortunately is. only too true that as regards American dealings with their books they can scarcely be in a worse position than that in which they are now situated, but with the English publishers it would be very easy to put matters in a far less satisfactory state, and the idea of allowing American books to be imported here while the export of English books is prohibited is obviously designed to compass this end. That it will be resisted the action of the heads of the leading London firms is enough to prove, and as what affects the trade of the heart of the kingdom must operate upon its provincial branches, it will be well for all country publishers and booksellers to keep themselves posted up in the progress of the negotiations, so that they may if necessary use their influence with their representatives in Parliament.

A question of very considerable importance to publishers has been recently determined in the Queen's Bench Division before Lord Coleridge and a special jury. The facts outside the issue are rather amusing, but it is not necessary to comment on them. It appears that Mr. Sprowl, the author of a work entitled 'Dreams of my Solitudes on the Mechanism of the Heavens,' employed Messrs. Waterlow and Sons to print, publish, and in fact pass the work for press, on terms which were mutually agreed upon. In the usual course of business the proof sheets were from time to time sent to the author for revision and necessary alteration. In performing the latter operation Mr. Sprowl is said to have dealt unmercifully with his own offspring, and to have so vigorously cut up his own composition as to increase most materially the costs of printing. On remonstrance made by the publishers, the author refused to pay anything for the alterations and press corrections he had made, and consequently Messrs. Waterlow declined to bring out the book. The real point at issue between the parties was whether the verbal agreement entered into provided that the publishers should bear the costs of the author's corrections of his own proofs, no matter what the cost might be, or otherwise. In the course of a very spirited argument, Lord Coleridge observed that as far as he understood the case the question was in substance this:—'The author desired immense alterations to be made in his work, and when they were made did not like them, and made many alterations in the proofs, and when they were made declined to pay for them.'

The verdict was entered for the defendants on the claim.

This is, no doubt, a case of vast importance, more so than would appear at first sight. We are ourselves aware of one case in which a well-known author and a well-known firm of publishers signed an agreement similar to that above mentioned, but with the difference that it contained a special clause whereby the author bound himself to pay the expenses for correcting proofs during the course of publication, with the exception of 10s. per sheet, which the publishers undertook to pay. As a matter of fact, the costs of the author's corrections amounted to five times the costs of the original composition. The author paid the entire amount without demur, but as all authors are not alike, it would certainly be prudent to insert in every agreement a clause similar to that above mentioned.

Sir John Lubbock's Bill for the consolidation of the Free Libraries Acts was down for second reading in the order paper of the House of Commons, on Tuesday night, the 22nd ult., but, thanks to the urgency of Irish obstruction and English coercion, it was only reached in the small hours of Wednesday morning, and, the clock pointing to 2.10, Sir Richard Cross naturally-suggested that it was a most inopportune hour for the discussion of the measure. Sir John Lubbock, however, was able to explain the object of his Bill, and said that it was proposed to raise the number of requisitionists necessary to obtain a préliminary meeting from ten to fifty, because it was not reasonable that a small number of ratepayers should be permitted to raise so large a question. If those who wish to adopt the Act could not secure a fair amount of support, they certainly could not carry their resolution. Secondly, it was proposed that after a library had been opened five years it should be possible to disestablish it. If it were unsuccessful it had better be closed. At present those who oppose the opening of a free library doubtless argued with some force when they said that such a library, even if useless, when once opened, could never be closed again. It was proposed, moreover, that boroughs should be allowed to combine for the purpose of a free library, even if they did not actually touch each other. Then it was proposed that the voting in these cases should be by voting papers, which would be much less troublesome to everyone and give more satisfactorily the real feeling of the ratepayers. In the case of museums, it was proposed to legalise lectures, which would certainly render them much more useful and instructive. It was not proposed to raise the present limit of a penny. As an illustration of the extent to which these lending libraries had been used, Sir John Lubbock showed that, according to the return for 1876, the total issue of books was, for the year, in Sheffield 316,000, Birmingham 505,000, Leeds, 377,000, Manchester 750,000, and Liverpool 800,000, the total number of books for England and Wales being in that year no less than 5,000,000. Since then, however, even these large numbers had greatly increased, and last year the volumes issued in Liverpool alone amounted to no less than 1,300,000. The good thus effected must be incalculable, and it was therefore very much to be regretted that there were still so many important towns which have not adopted the Acts. The Bill, Sir John added, had been carefully drafted, it was supported by the Free Libraries Association, and it was hoped it would commend itself to the judgment of the House.

One of the most valuable contributions that have been lately made to Bibliographical literature is the new Catalogue of the Brooklyn Library, U.S.A., prepared by Mr. S. B. Noves, the librarian of that institution. It comprises a general Alphabet of (first) Authors, (second) Titles, (third) Subjects and (fourth) Classes, with an alphabetical arrangement of sub-headings under general and complex subjects. Under each subject there are valuable cross-references, so that one may discover at a glance all the literature of the Library upon any given topic. Apart from its value as indicating the contents of the library, it will be of service to any reader of books for the fund of information which it contains regarding books and authors.

Messrs. Hurst & Blackett have just published a new work from the pen of Lord William Lennox, entitled 'Plays, Players, and Playhouses at Home and Abroad, with Anecdotes of the Drama and the Stage,' in 2 vols.

A new book by the popular author of 'John Halifax,' called 'His Little Mother, and other Tales and Sketches, in 1 vol., will appear in a few days from the press of Messrs. Hurst & Blackett.

A new novel by Miss Mary Cecil Hay, author of 'Old Myddelton's Money,' &c., entitled 'Missing!' has just been issued by Messrs. Hurst & Blackett in 3 vols., who announce a second edition of the clever novel by Mr. Beresford Hope, M.P., called 'Strictly Tied Up,' in 3 vols.

'Beside the River,' is the title of a new novel by Mrs. Macquoid, author of 'Patty,' &c., which will be published by Messrs. Hurst & Blackett during the present month in 3 vols.

We understand that the Bibliography of Thomas Carlyle is being prepared by Mr. R. H. Shepherd, and will be published uniformly with his other Bibliographies immediately by Mr. Elliot Stock.

Messrs. Griffith & Farran will publish shortly 'The Life of a Soul,' an Allegory illustrated by Sister Emma, C. S. B. Clewer, a small volume of poems and pictures intended less for instruction than to fill in quiet moments with graver thought, which might prove not only useful, but, it is hoped, pleasant also to the reader.

We are informed that 'The Birthday Text Book,' recently issued by Messrs. Milner & Co.,

has been handed over to Mr. W. Mack of London and Bristol.

Messrs. George Philip & Son, Liverpool, will shortly publish a new and unique work by Mr. J. F. Williams, F.R.G.S., entitled 'The Geography of the Oceans, Physical, Historical, and Descriptive,' with numerous maps and illustrations.

Mr. C. J. Longman gives 'A Publisher's View of International Copyright' in Fraser.

Mr. George Barnett Smith, author of Messrs. Cassell's Life of Mr. Gladstone, is writing a series of papers entitled 'Half-Hours with some Old Ambassadors' in London Society.

Lord Houghton succeeds Mr. Carlyle as President of the London Library.

Mr. Walter Smith (late Mozley & Smith) has removed from 6 Paternoster Row (so long associated with his firm under the title of J. & C. Mozley) to 34 King Street, Covent Garden. Professor Stanley Jevons contributes an article on 'The Rationale of Free Public Libraries' to the March No. of the Contemporary Review.

Mr. Childers' proposal, since withdrawn, to alter the Tartans of the Highland regiments, has suggested a paper on 'The Highland Tartan' by Lady John Manners, in the March number

of Blackwood.

At Oxford, on the 22nd ult., the sum of £250 per annum for three years was voted by

Convocation for additional assistance in the Bodleian Library.

The will of Mrs. Cross ('George Eliot') has been published. She leaves Charles Lee Lewes her sole executor. She bequeaths £5,000 to Miss Emily Clarke, £1,000 to Vivian Byam Lewes, an annuity of £100 to Mrs. Caroline Bray, and an annuity of £40 to her housekeeper, Mrs. Mary Dowling. The sum of £12,500 is to be set aside, in the names of her executor and her husband, as trustees, and the income paid to Mrs. Eliza Lewes, the widow of Herbert Arthur Lewes, for life or during widowhood, and on her death or second marriage, as to one moiety of the capital fund for her son, George Henry Lewes, and as to the other moiety for her daughter Marian Lewes. The residue is left to Charles Lee Lewes absolutely.

At the special request of Mr. Gladstone, a new edition is about to be published of 'Systems of Land Tenure in various Countries,' being a series of essays published under the sanction of the Cobden Club, and edited by Mr. J. W. Probyn. Messrs. Cassell, Petter, Galpin, & Co.

are the publishers.

Mr. Stephens's 'Life of Dean Hook' has reached a sixth edition.

An interesting publication is expected at Berlin shortly in the shape of a selection from the political correspondence between the Prince Consort and King William, now the German

Emperor.

A contribution also to the history of the Culturkampf is announced from the pen of Dr. Majunke, late editor of the clerical Germania and member of the Reichstag. The author goes as far back as 1859, and brings his narrative down to 1874. Beginning with Herr von Bennigsen, Dr. Majunke, who calls his book 'Das Evangelische Kaiserthum,' closes his narrative with the first open rupture between Germany and the Curia, when Prince Bismarck struck out of the Imperial Budget the item for the support of a German Ambassador at the Vatican.

The article on 'Pessimism,' in the February number of the Churchman's Shilling Magazine, which has excited considerable attention as the first really exhaustive treatment of the subject in a compact and readable form, is from the pen of a well-known English clergyman, who

recently contributed to the same serial a series of articles on 'The Resurrection.'

A work which will find as ready a public South or North of the Tweed is in the press, under the editorship of Mr. Frank Henderson, M.P., consisting of extracts from the unpublished MSS. of the late George Gilfillan. Mr. David Douglas will be the Edinburgh publisher.

A new musical work by Mr. Crowest, author of 'Celebrated Composers' and 'Musical

Anecdotes,' is to be published by Mr. Murray.

The Queen has accepted from Michael Reynolds ('the Engine-Driver's Friend') a copy of his 'Engine-Driving Life,' published by Messrs. Crosby Lockwood & Co., which we recently noticed.

Mr. Percy Fitzgerald's 'Life of George the Fourth' has just been published in 2 vols. by

Messrs. Tinsley Brothers.

Messrs. Puttick & Simpson have been busy with theological libraries. On the 24th ult. they sold a collection of books from the libraries of Mr. Henry Webb, of Clapham, the Rev. Richard Goldham, of Lee Park, and Father Cudden, of Soho, including a complete set of the Parker Society publications. On Thursday next they will sell the library of the Rev. Maxwell Ben Oliel, which is said to be rich in Roman and patristic literature. Another valuable collection of Roman Catholic works belonging to the late Very Rev. R. F. Whitehead, vice-president of St. Patrick's College Maynooth, is to be sold by Messrs. Sotheby, Wilkinson, & Hodge, on the 21st of March.

Dr. Burgess, Vicar of St. Andrew's, Whittlesea, the blind clergyman, whose volume on 'The Art of Preaching and the Composition of Sermons' is announced, was for many years editor of the now defunct Clerical Journal, and wrote many of the very able literary reviews

which appeared in that paper.

The new Provost of Trinity College, Dublin, who succeeds to the comfortable income of £4.000 a year, with a good house, is chiefly known in literary circles by his scientific writings. He is one of the ablest mathematicians of the day, one of his earliest publications being his 'Treatise on the Calculus of Variations,' published at Dublin in 1850. He has also published

an 'Essay on Some of the Moral Difficulties of the Old Testament.'

It is but a few weeks since we had the pleasure of noticing the first instalment of Mr. Engelmann's elaborate B bliothecu Scriptorum classicorum, in an eighth edition. We have now before us a second and similar part, which completes the first division of the work, the first half, in fact. This first division—or Erste Abtheilung, as on the title-page—gives us the bibliography of the Greek classics in rather more than 800 pages 8vo. of close and beautiful print. Such is the completeness of the work, that even school essays on a Greek author are not passed by; as we gather from the expression 'Gymn. Progr.' We will take this opportunity of explaining one term or contraction of a term which may puzzle the English reader. It will be observed in the latter of the two entries here given—

'Ebenda.' short for Ebendaselbst (the same place) signifies that the paper on the Anabasis is

also to be found in the Jahrbücher für classische Philologie, at the place indicated.

Messrs. The object of the compiler has been to provide for communicants a Guide to the Blessed Sacrament, as complete, and at the same time as simple and concise, as possible. The chief characteristic of the manual will be that it contains the entire Office for Holy Communion, including the Collects, Epistles, and Gospels, together with a suitable collection of hymns. This completeness, obviating as it does the necessity for using several books, will, it is hoped, be found very convenient in these days when the celebration of the Holy Communion as a separate service has become very general.

Messra. C. Mitchell & Co., of Red Lion Court, have sent us the new yearly issue of their Sewspaper Press Directory.' It is a complete advertiser's guide, giving full particulars of every newspaper, review, magazine, and periodical published in the United Kingdom and the British Isles. It has a newspaper map of the United Kingdom; it gives an account of the principal American and Continental papers. And there is added a 'class' directory of newspapers and periodicals. We may add that the advertisements at the end of the book are

themselves interesting, as furnishing the conductor's own description of the views and aim of

their respective papers.

### AMERICAN NEWS AND NOTES.

The American Publishers' Announcements of forthcoming books for the spring season are as follows:—

Messrs. D. Appleton & Co., New York, will publish at once 'A History of Greece, from the Earliest Times to the Present,' in two vols., by T. T. Timayenis, with Map and Illustrations; 'The New Nobility, a Story of Europe and America,' by Col. J. W. Forney, author of 'Anecdotes of Public Men'; also, The Art of School Management,' a Text-book for Normal Schools and Normal Institutes, and a Reference Book for Teachers, School Officers, and Parents, by J. Baldwin. The same firm have just published a new poem of some 400 stanzas, in the vol., entitled 'The Vision of Nimrod, an Oriental Romance,' by Charles de Kay, author of 'Hesperus and other Poems.' The London edition is issued by Messrs. Sampson Low, Marston, & Co.

Mr. D. G. Brinton, Philadelphia, has in preparation a work on Hydrophobia, by H. R. Bigelow, M.D.; also a 'Compend of Microscopical Technology,' by Carl Seiler, M.D., intended as a guide to physicians and students in the use of the microscope and in the preparation of histological and pathological specimens.

Messrs. Babbitt & Co., of New York, announce a work, in one volume, fully illustrated, called 'Religion as Revealed by the Material and Spiritual Universe,' by Dr. E. D. Babbitt,

Harper & Brothers, New York, will issue shortly an 'Encyclopædia of English and American Poetry, completely edited some weeks before his death by the late Epes Sargent, They will also publish 'The Chinese: their Education, Philosophy, and Letters,' by President Martin, of the Tung-wen (Peking) College; and an enlarged edition of their Index to Harper's Magazine. The second volume of Colonel J. W. Forney's 'Anecdotes of Public Men,' including sketches of several hundred additional celebrities in America and

abroad, is about to be published by the same firm.

The 'Indian Question' seems to be coming to the front in American literature. Besides 'A Century of Dishonour,' by 'H. H.', just issued by Messrs. Harper & Brothers, there will soon appear a work by Joaquin Miller, to be published by Messrs. Jansen, McClurg & Co., Chicago, in the form of fiction, but giving actual facts and personal observations concerning the treatment of Indians on some of the far Western reservations; Messrs. Fords, Howard, and Hulbert, New York, also announce 'Ploughed Under,' a novel containing the 'early impressions, experiences, and ideas of an Indian chief, largely in his own words'; and Messrs. Lee & Shepard, Boston, have in preparation a work by General O. O. Howard, U.S.A., relating to his famous Oregon campaign against Chief Nez Percés Joseph. All of these works, except possibly the last, are understood to be strongly on the side of the Indian.

Messrs. Houghton, Mifflin, & Co., Boston, have in press a 'Life of Voltaire,' by James Parton, author of the Life of Jefferson' &c. The same firm have nearly ready Mr. Whittier's new volume, 'The King's Missive, Poems, and Lyrics,' which will include all the poems Mr. Whittier has written since 'The Vision of Echard.' A volume of 'Stories and Romances,' by Mr. Horace E. Scudder, is also announced by them; and they have arranged with the eminent Norwegian writer Bjornstjerne Bjornson to bring out an American edition of his works. Messrs. Houghton, Mifflin, & Co. are also to publish, by special arrangements with the English publishers, American editions of the two leading quarterly reviews, the Edinburgh

and the Quarterly from the original plates.

Messrs. Lee & Shepard, Boston, are shortly to publish a book by the Rev. James Freeman Clarke, entitled 'The Legend of Thomas Didymus,' in which, under the form of fiction, will be given a picture of the social, political, and religious state of the world at the time of Christ.

This house has nearly ready a new edition of 'The Speeches of Wendell Phillips'; and

Gleanings in the Fields of Art,' by Mrs. Ednah D. Cheney.

The Library Journal, issued by Mr. F. Leypoldt of New York, we learn, will be continued another year, and at more frequent intervals. The second volume of the 'American Catalogue,' issued under the direction of Mr. Leypoldt (being the classified index to the whole work) is now in the printer's hands for early publication.

Messrs. J. B. Lippincott & Co., Philadelphia, have in press 'The Origin of Primitive Superstitions,' by R. M. Dorman. The same firm will publish this month a new and thoroughly revised edition of 'A Practical Treatise on Diseases of the Skin,' by Louis A.

Duhring, M.D., author of 'Atlas of Skin Diseases,' &c., &c., illustrated.

Messrs. D. Lothrop & Co., Boston, will publish this month, 'Chips from the White House,' a book of selections from the speeches, conversations, diaries, letters, and other writings of all the Presidents of the United States, from Washington to (and including) Garfield. The same firm have in preparation a series of 'Young People's Biographies,' edited by Fred H. Allen. The first book will be devoted to Cortes and the Conquest of Mexico, to be followed by Columbus and the Discovery of America, Pizarro and the Conquest of Peru, and others, all fully illustrated.

Mr. J. Brander Matthews, the author of the 'Theatres of Paris,' and of several well-received magazine articles on the French drama, is engaged on a new book to be called 'French Dramatists of the Nineteenth Century,' which is to contain studies of the chief playwrights

of France.

The American Law Review, which has for a long time stood at the head of the periodical legal press of the United States, was a year ago changed from a quarterly to a monthly. During the past year it has been carried on by the publishers, Messrs. Little, Brown & Co., Boston, but hereafter it is to be edited by Mr. Charles F. Grinnell, of the Boston bar, who has, we believe, done a great deal of editorial work upon it already. Each number now contains two leading articles, a number of book notices, and a 'Review of the Month,' a valuable department of which is 'Notes of Exchanges.' Each number has also an index. Messrs. Sampson Low & Co. are prepared to receive subscriptions to the magazine. Terms on application.

Mr. Charles Lanman is about to bring out, through Messrs. Anglim & Co., of Washington, a new and uniform edition of all his publications. The titles are as follows:—'Essays for Summer Hours,' 'A Summer in the Wilderness,' 'A Tour to the River Saguenay,' 'Letters from the Alleghany Mountains,' 'A Tour to the River Restigouche,' 'A Winter in the South,' 'A Tour from the Potomac to Montauk,' 'Occasional Records of a Tourist,' 'Private Life of Daniel Webster,' 'Biographical Essays,' 'Evenings in my Library,' 'Curious Characters,' 'Japaniana,' 'Hap-hazard Personalities.' Mr. Lanman is also the author of the 'Dictionary of Congress,' 'Biographical Annals of the Civil Government of the United States,' and other

works.

Messrs. J. R. Osgood & Co., Boston, will publish at once the second volume of the 'Memorial History of Boston, 1630-1880,' and the first part of 'Illustrations of the Earth's Structure,' by Prof. N. S. Shaler and Mr. Wm. Morris Davis, which will be devoted to Glaciers. Messrs. Osgood & Co. also have in preparation, in book form, the letters on the philosophical movement in Germany which have appeared in the New York Nation from time to time, written by Mr. G. Stanley Hall. It is stated that a 'Memorial History of America,' on the plan of the 'Memorial History of Boston,' consisting of monographs by special scholars, will be undertaken by the same firm. Mr. Justin Winsor, editor of the Boston work and librarian of Harvard University, is to have charge of the new work, of which he is said to be the originator. No names of writers are yet announced, but the project is regarded so favourably by the Massachusetts Historical Society that at its last meeting it voted to appoint a committee of its members, with Hon. Robert C. Winthrop at its head, to co-operate and counsel with Mr. Winsor.

The New York Times says:—'Mr. Francis Parkman is diligently working away upon his history of the French Seven Years' War and the career of Montcalm, for which during his recent visit to Europe he made large accessions in the way of unpublished matter. He is obliged to wait for further important materials from England before the work can be completed. The new work has grown upon his hands into two volumes instead of one, and still another volume will be required before his story of the French occupation of North America will be

complete.'

Mr. Ben Perley Poore, author of 'The Political Register and Congressional Directory,'

is writing his recollections of Washington life for the last half-century.

G. P. Putnam's Sons announce the publication in book form, under the title of 'The Journal of a Farmer's Daughter,' of the series of prose articles from the hand of Miss Elaine Goodale, which appeared in the Christian Union last summer. The same firm have in press a new novel by Anna R. Green, author of 'The Leavenworth Case,' entitled 'The Sword of Damocles.'

Director J. W. Powell, of the Smithsonian Bureau of Ethnology, has just issued a second

edition, revised, of his 'Introduction to the Study of Indian Languages.'

Dr. Storrs's oration on 'John Wycliffe and the First English Bible,' delivered at the Academy of Music, New York, last month, has been printed, by A. D. F. Randolph & Co., New York, as a pamphlet of 85 pp. 8vo.

### OBITUARY.

The death is announced, at the age of 81, of Mr. William Ellis, well known as a worker in the cause of education, and as an earnest promoter of economic and commercial science. In rapid succession he wrote for the use of schools a number of text-books, some of which have had considerable circulation and repute. Of these the chief were 'Progressive Lessons in Social Science,' Outlines of Social Economy,' Philo-Socrates,' Religion in Common Life,' and 'Education as a Means of Preventing Destitution.' The small volume which appeared under the name of the late Dean Dawes, of Hereford, who contributed a preface, probably exercised a larger influence than any of his other works. It was entitled 'Lessons on the Phenomena of Industrial Life and the Conditions of Industrial Success.' Subsequently, in connection with his friend, the Rev. W. Jowitt, then the head master of the Middle-class School in Finsbury, he wrote another text-book, with the same general aim, entitled 'Helps to the Young.' He was the founder, in 1848, of the first Birkbeck school, and soon afterwards of six or eight similar institutions on a large scale, in different parts of London. Several of his text-books on economics have been translated into foreign languages; and two of them have recently been introduced, by the authority of the Government, into the primary schools of France.

M. Paulin Paris, the translator of Byron's entire works and memoirs (1827 to 1832), an official of the National Library from 1828 to 1853, and afterwards Professor of Medieval Literature at the Collège de France, died recently at the age of 80. He was a great authority on the Arthurian legend and other mediæval compositions; his son, M. Gaston Paris, being also a professor and a student of comparative philology.

A name which had many associations with the publishing world occurs in the obituary of the past fortnight, the Hon. Grantley Berkeley having died at Longfleet, Poole, on the 23rd inst. A younger son of the Earl of Berkeley, and heir-presumptive to that title, he was born in 1800, and while yet in his teens was presented by the Prince Regent, his godfather, with a commission in the Coldstream Guards. In 1832, having some years previously retired from the Army on half-pay, he was returned for the western division of Gloucestershire, which he represented until 1847. It was during this period that his memorable quarrel with Fraser's Magazine occurred. One of his earliest works, a novel entitled 'Berkeley Castle,' was sharply criticised in that periodical—so sharply, indeed, that he was led to assault its publisher. Mr. Fraser brought an action against him, and he had to pay £100 damages. On Maginn avowing that he was the author of the article in question, Mr. Berkeley sent him a challenge, and in the duel which followed was wounded. For some years Mr. Berkeley had been an indefatigable Not to speak of a few poems and many contributions to periodical literature upon sporting subjects, he wrote 'The Upper Ten Thousand at Home and Abroad,' 'My Life and Recollections,' 'Landon Hall,' 'Reminiscences of a Huntsman,' 'A Month in the Forests of France,' 'The English Sportsman in the Western Prairies,' and 'Fact against Fiction: the Habits and Treatment of Animals practically considered: Hydrophobia and Distempers, with some Remarks on Darwin.'

The death of Lord William Pitt Lennox is announced in his eighty-second year. As a lecturer and a discursive writer he was well known. He contributed to many magazines and annuals, and his pen was also frequently employed upon contributions to the serials which dealt with military and sporting topics. He wrote largely for Once a Week when it was at the zenith of its career, under the editorship of Mr. Samuel Lucas. He published, in 1863, the reminiscences of his early career, under the title of 'Fifty Years' Recollections. He wrote a few works of fiction, including 'Compton Audley,' 'The Tuft-hunter,' 'Percy Hamilton,' and 'Philip Courtenay.' Besides the above, his lordship was the author of 'Three Years with the Duke of Wellington in Private Life,' 'Merrie England, its Sports and Pastimes,' 'Recreations of a Sportsman,' 'Pictures of Sporting Life and Character,' 'Life of the Duke of Richmond,' 'Adventures of a Man of Family,' 'The Victoria Cross,' &c.

Died on Monday, February 14, 1881, at Belton House, Tunbridge Wells, Mr. Thomas William Clarke, late of Mansfield, Notts, who had successfully carried on the business of bookseller, printer, and stationer for upwards of thirty years, and who had retired in the autumn of 1875—an extremely upright and just gentleman, whose death, occurring rather suddenly at the age of 57 years, will cause great grief to a large circle of relatives and friends.

William Chauncey Fowler, LL.D., the author of many works on English grammar, &c., died at his home in Durham, Conn., U.S.A., January 15. He was born at Clinton, Conn., September 1, 1793, and graduated at Yale College in 1816. From 1819 to 1823 he was a tutor at Yale, and from 1823 to 1827 pastor of the Congregational church at Greenfield, Mass. He was professor of chemistry and natural history in Middlebury College from 1827 to 1838, and was professor of rhetoric and oratory in Amherst College from 1838 to 1843. He was the son-in-law of Noah Webster, and edited the University edition of Webster's Dictionary, published in 1845. In 1850 he published a treatise on 'The English Language in its Elements and Forms.' Prof. Fowler also published 'Conditions of Success in General Investigations, as illustrated in the Character of Nathaniel Chauncey,' an 'Elementary English Grammar for Common Schools,' 'Essays,' 'The Sectional Controversy' (1863), and 'The History of Durham, Conn.'

To the Editor of the 'Publishers' Circular.'

SIR,—There is a passage at p. 126 of this day's issue that requires modification or explanation, viz. No action of Parliament is needed to sanction the importation of American reprints of English books—the author's consent is all that is needful.' I should like to see a reference to your authority for this statement, or a quotation of the passage. Most of our popular authors have American editions, but we do not see copies of these editions sold in England; in point of fact, his consent, if given, would be overridden by the English 'Law of Copyright.'

BOOKS RECEIVED :-

From Messrs. Appleton & Co., New York.—
'North American Review,' February, 2nd edition.
This is such a remarkable number that we are tempted to name four of the articles. They are—The Nicaragua Canal, by General Grant; the Pulpit and the Pew, by Oliver Wendell Holmes; Did Shakespeare write Bacon's works? by J. F. Clarke; the Poetry of the Future, by Walt Whitman.

From Messrs. Burns & Oates.—'The Life of Father John Gerard, of the Society of Jesus,' by John Morris, of the same Society. Third edition. The author of this remarkable work, which is interesting, not only to the antiquarian, but to the student of English history, has, in the present edition, re-written the life of Father Gerard, and has virtually given to it all the freshness of a new book. The sufferings of the Father in the Tower and elsewhere are recorded with a painful minuteness by his own hand, and even those who have no sympathy with the faith of the Roman Church, for his devotion to which he suffered so terribly, will find a remarkable portraiture of a period of the religious life of this country which is now almost forgotten. The book is illustrated by some admirably executed photographs.

From Messrs. Griffith & Farran.—'Grandpapa's Verses and Pictures; or, Natural History in Play,' by T. P. M., with twenty-eight illustrations by R. H. Moore. The author of this pretty children's book tells us, in the preface, that it is the fruit of a practice which he adopted in order to gratify his grandchildren, of copying the woodcuts of a work on Natural History into a MS. book, and then writing descriptive verses upon them. The pictures here given are capitally drawn, and the poems in homely phrase tell the children of some of the characteristics and habits of the birds and the beasts sketched for their delectation.

From Messrs. Hodder & Stoughton.— 'Stephen Grellet,' by William Guest, F.G.S. A new volume of the publishers' series of 'Men Worth Remembering, supplying a sketch of the remarkable French Quaker, whose philanthropic efforts during the wars of the First Napoleon form the subject of two large volumes by Benjamin Seebolim, from which this briefer biography has been compiled. As a narrative of the experiences of the young French aristocrat in his passage from Roman Catholicism to the ultra simplicity of the faith of the Society of Friends, the book is full of interest, and the story of his conversion recalls that of St. Augustine. Brought into connection with the Quakers, he was led to study the English Bible, and he then went to the United States, where he became intimately

associated with the members of the Society, and entered on the career of charitable effort which won for him well-deserved honour. His visits to Russia, to Italy, and to many European countries are fully described down to the close of his remarkable life, in 1855, when he died in the United States, still firmly adhering to the body to which his devotion never wayered.

From Messrs. W. & A. K. Johnston.—'The Statistical Atlas of England, Scotland, and Ireland.' Edited by G. Phillips Bevan, F.S.S., F.G.S., &c. Part I. Religious. This work, which will, when completed, form a perfect library of reference on nearly every matter of interest to the religionist, the philanthropist, and the politician, presents, in tabular form, a series of statistics in the various departments of the subjects dealt with, accompanied by illustrative maps. In the part before us, for instance, we have a complete résumé of the existing condition of the various religious bodies, their ministers, congregations, &c., and then follow maps illustrating the religious condition of the people. As, however, the last religious census was taken thirty years ago, the figures can, in many instances, obviously only present an approximation to the actual state of things, although, in other cases—as, for example, in regard to the diocesan officials and cathedral clergy—various sources of information have been freely utilised, and the diocese of Liverpool, for instance, is fully represented in the tables. The clearness of the printing and the perfect execution of the maps add not a little to the merits of the work.

From Messrs. Little, Brown, & Co., Boston.— Grimm's 'Life and Times of Goethe.' We are almost inclined to think this the most interesting monograph on Germany's greatest writer which has ever appeared. That is saying much, because, if there is a subject which has been discussed to death in Germany, the land of disquisition, it is Goethe; and, besides, it is not so many years since the English-speaking world received the best biography of Goethe which exists from the hands of perhaps the most versatile author of England. The book before us is a comparative study, which can be read with profit by any admirer of Goethe, however familiar he may be with Goethe-Literatur. Horr Grimm—a nephew, by the way, of the celebrited brothers Grimm-traces the causes and effects of the productions of the wonderful mind he examines; these causes and effects being, in part, writings from other countries. Thus, Werthers Leiden has light shed upon it from both France and England, as shown by these few lines:—

The world admired St. Preux and Julie as glorious representatives of the ideas which stirred the age, and they believed in them as they had in Richardson's creations. Their highest wish was to feel as these souls felt, and to see the world as they saw it. The air which Goethe breathed was filled with Rousseau's spirit, and we have only to compare Werther and Lotte with St. Preux and Julie to be convinced that without the latter the former would never have been created.

A volume of which the above is less than a twothousandth part needs not commendation of ours. It is strengthened by a chronological summary of Goethe's life, year by year, and by a good index.

Warren's 'Elementary Projection Drawing,' 5th edition, one of the 'Industrial Science' series. It is arranged in six divisions, viz.: I. Elementary projection; II. Details of masonry, wood and metal constructions; III. Elementary shadows and shading; IV. Isometrical and oblique projections; V. Elements of machines; VI. Simple structures and machines. The work is illustrated by 24 folding &c. plates, and is printed in almost what we call demy 8vo. size. The binding is of stout cloth.

From the same.—'Text book of Elementary Mechanics,' by Edward S. Dana; for colleges and schools. The chief aim has been to present the principles in logical order, and concisely. Simple illustrations are introduced more fully than usual, and the articles are so arranged that a student who is 'upon' a particular branch of the

subject can select the sections which he requires. The book is limited to the mechanics of solids. Examples to show the application of the principles are given at the end of each division, and the answers to them at a latter stage of the work. The volume is a crown octavo of 300 pages, in stout cloth.

From Messrs. Wyman & Co.—'Jacob's Ladder,' by Barbara Wordsworth. This is a collection of short stories very much above the average, somewhat pathetic, but all charmingly told. The authoress intersperses some poems and poetry set to music through her volume. The verses show a genuine poetic feeling, which is more than can be said of nine-tenths of the verse of the day. In fact, 'Jacob's Ladder' will surely make its way when its modest charms get known.
