In our last issue we gave a summary of The Law Amendment Society's Copyright Bill. We have now much satisfaction in being permitted to quote the following excellent letters on this subject from Mr. Herbert Spencer, which we think will be generally accepted as very efficient replies to the somewhat theoretical views of The Law Amendment Society. If leading authors generally would take as much active and intelligent interest in a question of such great importance to themselves as does Mr. Herbert Spencer, and if Mr. Hastings would be guided by their practical advice, there would be some hope of his producing a satisfactory Bill; but with all respect for The Law Amendment Society, we are unable to regard them as safe and reliable guides to such an end.

Sir,—I perceive by the note at the end of the report on copyright, which accompanies your circular, that the proposed Bill of Mr. Hastings is to give effect to the recommendation of the Commissioners, that colonial reprints paying royalty shall be allowed to enter the United Kingdom and compete with the author's home editions.

So far from any benefit to the author being given by a Bill, whatever its other provisions, which contains such a provision as this, I hold that there will be done a mischief exceeding all possible benefits. I would rather cancel absolutely all proposed amendments of copyright law, and leave the law standing as it now does, than make the change proposed.

To the plea put in that, by such a measure, cheaper literature is to be secured to the English public, I reply that I hold it to be no business whatever of the State to take any measures for securing cheap literature, any more than it is its business to secure cheap food or cheap anything else. All it has to do in such matters is to remove its own *artificial hindrances* to cheapness. The proposal, along with all kindred proposals urged by Mr. Farrer and Sir Louis Mallet in the alleged interests of free trade, I hold to be diametrically opposed in principle to free trade, and certain to be mischievous in the same way that all past interferences with prices of commodities or other things have proved to be. With the trading transactions between the author and the public, the State has no other concern than that which it has with trading transactions in general; namely, to let those who buy and sell be free to make what contracts they please, and then to enforce the contracts thus made. Extension of free trade has been in all past cases nothing else than extension of freedom of contract; and extension of free trade in the matter of literature cannot but be of the same nature. There is free trade between author and reader when the author is free to make what contract, overt or tacit, he pleases, and the reader free to accede to his terms or refuse them—such a tacit contract made by the author (or his agent on his behalf) being that a book shall be used for reading purposes only, and not for reprinting; since obviously he would not sell the book for the price he does were it avowedly for reprinting purposes; and this tacit contract holds with those who may subsequently acquire the book, since they cannot be supposed to have become possessed of a right which was not originally consciously sold by the author or his agent.

Trade between author and reader is not free whenever the State, instead of enforcing the contracts thus made, interferes between the two, directly or indirectly, and regulates in any way the prices paid by the one, or the profits made by the other.

The regulation in question beyond all denial does interfere between author and reader. Under it the State has to say that the author shall permit sales under such and such conditions; he is not allowed to make and insist upon his own conditions; and this proceeding practically amounts to a regulation of his rates of profit. As to the assertion that the public under the proposed method will benefit and the author will not be injured, it is an assertion that the State knows what rates and modes of payment will benefit the author or publisher, better than the author or publisher themselves. The assumption is that the State has such supreme knowledge, and such experience of the buying and selling of books, that the author is to be instructed by it as to his most profitable policy. And this is the assumption which, in past times, has been involved in all State interferences with trade. There is no better reason for supposing that State judgment is valid in this particular branch of commerce than for supposing that it is valid in others. And having been proved invalid in others it may be inferred as certain that it would prove invalid in this.

Rather than subscribe to aid the passing of a Bill containing a clause authorising the admission of colonial reprints, I will cheerfully, and, indeed, eagerly subscribe for the purpose of opposing such a Bill.

DEAR SIR,—You ask my opinion respecting the term during which colonial reprints shall not be admitted, as now to be proposed in modification of the Bill as at present drawn; and you tell me that probably a period of one year will be suggested. My reply is simply that such a limitation would practically amount to nothing; no appreciable protection would arise from it in those cases where, above all, protection is needed. Ephemeral books—novels of the day, gossiping biographies, and other such works of which the torrent that comes from the press smothers works of permanent worth, would receive from it some advantage. The regulation would give further diffusion to the particular kind of literature which there is no need further to diffuse—literature which, already devoured in excess, would rather need discouragement were it within the province of the State either to encourage or discourage. But the books of a graver kind, not appealing to those who idly read for amusement—books which at best have but a small sale, and if they do not bring loss to the author bring usually very little profit, would stand in the position that if by chance any of them did become so far in demand that cheap editions promised to pay, the authors would be substantially deprived of the advantage. For such books do not even pay their expenses, much less yield a profit, under several years from the date of publication; so that practically the limitation spoken of, in so far as they are concerned, would not exist. The authors of books on which commonly much labour is expended, and from which the likelihood of any considerable remuneration is remote, would be made to feel that the writing of such books was even more imprudent from a pecuniary point of view than it has hitherto been; since they would be taught that in the event of a success beyond probability, the possible profit would be in large measure taken from them. While they would be left to bear the loss or inadequate payment probably resulting, they would have the additional discouragement that they could not look forward to a possible considerable remuneration, should a large sale eventually promise it to them. I hold that the result would inevitably be discouragement to those who most need encouragement by the strict protection of their claims.

Holding that the proposed modification is altogether nominal, I still contend that the Bill had better be wholly cancelled, leaving copyright standing just as it does, rather than it should be carried containing the provision in question. Should it be proceeded with in this form, or anything like this form, I shall urge sundry authors, who I know thoroughly coincide with me, to join me in petitioning against it.

P.S.—It occurs to me that it may be considered by the committee that what I have said is simply inference, and is not verified by direct evidence. I will therefore add that facts to support this statement are contained in the evidence I gave before the Copyright Commission. Had such a regulation as

the proposed one been in force during the last thirty years, the result to me would have been that having in the course of fifteen years lost by my books nearly £1,200, I should, when they became successful, have had to meet the competition of imported reprints; and should so have been debarred from even repaying my losses, which I did in the course of the succeeding nine years, and should, of course, have been prevented from making such moderate profits as I now do. It may be judged from this what would be, under the proposed regulation, the prospect for any author pursuing a like career.

Another exhibition and market of machinery, implements, and material used or sold by printers, stationers, paper-makers, and kindred trades is to be held at the Agricultural Hall at Islington, from the 14th to the 27th of July next. The success of the last exhibition was, as our readers will remember, so great that it was found necessary to extend the period during which it was originally intended to open it, while its financial results were so satisfactory that the considerable donation of 100*l.*, as a part of the profits, was handed over by Mr. Robert Dale, the secretary and manager, to the Printers' Pension Corporation. The exhibition this year will include articles of the same character as the last, and its purely business character will be maintained. While, however, the avowed object of the show is to enable makers and manufacturers to bring their articles under the notice of the various branches of the trades represented in the Hall, there can be but little doubt that it will meet with considerable public patronage, and that it will deserve this is abundantly proved by the adhesion to the scheme of all the leading firms. Among those who have promised their support to the undertaking we find the Lord Provost of Edinburgh; Dr. Cameron, M.P.; Mr. John Walter, M.P.; Mr. W. J. Ingram, M.P.; Mr. E. Lloyd; Messrs. Spottiswoode & Co., Eyre & Spottiswoode, Truscott & Son, Waterlow Brothers & Layton, Bemrose & Sons, Waterlow & Sons, Clowes & Son, Marcus Ward & Co., McCorquodale & Co. (Limited), Jarrold & Sons, Wyman & Sons, and many of the leading provincial houses. The tariff of charges for exhibiting space in the great hall seems to be arranged on a very moderate scale, and members of the represented trades are to be supplied with tickets of admission at half-price if they apply before July 7. This latter concession is of material importance, as it will enable apprentices and workmen to visit the exhibition, a privilege which, we understand, was highly appreciated by them on the last occasion. It is to be hoped, moreover, that if a profit again results from the exhibition, the Printers' Pension Corporation will receive another welcome donation to its funds.

Exceptional interest will, there can be but little doubt, be felt in the approaching anniversary dinner—the ninety-second—of the Royal Literary Fund, from the fact that the Right Hon. James Russell Lowell, the American minister, will occupy the chair. Mr. Lowell has, since his appointment to the Court of St. James's, lost no opportunity of manifesting his sympathy with English authors and with the cause of English literature generally, and his appearance as president of this festival will make it a red-letter day in the calendar of the Fund. By way of an 'advance proof' of the determination of public men of all ranks to support his Excellency on the occasion, it is only needful to point to the first two lists of stewards already issued, for they contain names eminent in all ranks of society. Among the literary men who will be present are the Poet Laureate, Sir Theodore Martin, the Secretary of the Admiralty—a worthy successor to Mr. Pepys, once holder of the same office—Mr. Justin McCarthy, M.P., Mr. Tom Hughes, and Mr. Leslie Stephen. Journalism will be represented by Mr. G. A. Sala, Mr. Edmund Yates, Mr. George Godwin, Mr. Frederick Locker, and Mr. Blanchard Jerrold. Among names honoured in the publishing world we note Mr. George Bentley, Mr. William Blackwood, Mr. T. D. Galpin, Mr. G. H. Longman, Mr. John Murray, junior. The general body of stewards includes Mr. Benjamin, Q.C., Mr. Edgar Rodwell, Q.C., and other gentlemen learned in the law, Mr. Lionel Beale as the representative of medical science, Mr. Henry Irving as the exponent of the higher side of the dramatic art, Sir Richard Temple, Bart., Mr. Samuel Morley, and Sir Thomas Nelson. There is thus every prospect of a 'feast of reason' worthy of the occasion and of the object of the gathering.

Many rare and valuable works were included in Messrs. Puttick & Simpson's sale on Monday and Tuesday last, and a note of the prices and purchasers of some of the more important 'lots' will be interesting to our readers. A copy of the *Edition de Luxe* of Thackeray was sold to Mr. W. Carter for £31; Bell & Daldy's Aldine Edition of the English Poets sold for £8 (Holden); Sowerby's 'English Botany,' £18. 15*s.* (Quaritch); Savage's 'Genealogical Dictionary of the First Settlers in New England,' £6. 5*s.* (Stevens); Ruskin's 'Modern Painters,' first edition (vol. 1, third edition), £26 (Toovey); John Smith's Catalogue Raisonné of the works of the most eminent Dutch, Flemish, and French painters, original edition, £12. 5*s.* (Quaritch); Boydell's edition of Shakespeare, revised by G. Steevens, £14. 10*s.* (Sampson); Owen Jones's 'Grammar of Ornament,' £11. (Quaritch); Houbraken & Vertue's Portraits, £16. 10*s.* (Sotheran); first edition of 'Hamerton's Etching and Etchers,' £7. 5*s.* (Paterson); Rousseau's 'Lettre sur la Musique Française' (author's copy, with autograph inscription), £8. 10*s.* (Cole). Captain Ross bought Mrs. Piozzi's copy of the 'History of Rasselas' for £10, and her 'Imperial Family Bible,' with its annotations and references to Dr.



Johnson, for £21. The first edition of Keats's 'Lamia,' 'Isabella,' the 'Eve of St. Agnes,' and other poems, belonging to Mrs. E. L. Emerson, fetched £8. 15s. (Robson); Pascal's 'Letters,' original edition, £15 (Cole); Spenser's 'Faerie Queen,' first complete edition (vol. 1, wanting sheet m m), £6. 12s. 6d. (J. Pearson), and the first edition of Montaigne's 'Essays,' the authentic text published by his niece, £48 (Quaritch).

A copy of Mr. Carlyle's will, which, like the document relating to the grant to the University of Edinburgh, is written by Mr. Carlyle himself, has been published. The will, which occupies more than a column and a half of small type in the *Times*, was prepared in 1873, when Mr. Carlyle's brother, Dr. John Aitken Carlyle, the translator of Dante, and Mr. John Forster, were alive, and they were appointed executors and trustees. Failing them, Mr. James Carlyle and Mr. Froude were to take their places. To Dr. Carlyle the testator bequeaths his 'poor and almost pathetic collection of books.' To his nephew Thomas he gives, with many minute directions, his watch, 'of all my outward possessions become the dearest to me.' 'It was given to me on my wedding by one who was herself invaluable to me. It had been her father's, made to her father's order; and had measured out into still more perfect punctuality his noble years of well-spent time; and now it has measured out (always punctually, it) nearly forty-seven years of mine, and still measures, as with an ever-loving solemnity, till time quite end with me.' Mr. Carlyle then expresses his gratitude to the friendliness and 'actually credible human love' shown him in America, especially in New England, and testifies to the 'immensities of worth and capability' he believes and partly knows 'to be lodged especially in the silent classes there.' In token of this feeling he bequeaths the books used in writing his 'Cromwell' and 'Frederick' to the President and Fellows of Harvard College. The manuscript entitled 'Letters and Memorials of Jane Welsh Carlyle' is left to Mr. Froude, for him 'to do his best and wisest in the matter,' as Mr. Carlyle feels assured he will. The will continues:—'There is incidentally a quantity of autobiographic record in my notes to this manuscript; but except as subsidiary and elucidative of the text I put no value on such. Express biography of me I had really rather that there should be none. James Anthony Froude, John Forster, and my brother John will make earnest survey of the manuscript and its subsidiaries there or elsewhere in respect to this as well as to its other bearings; their united utmost candour and impartiality, taking always James Anthony Froude's practicality along with it, will evidently furnish a better judgment than mine can be. The manuscript is by no means ready for publication; nay, the questions how, when (after what delay, seven, ten years), it, or any portion of it, should be published, are still dark to me; but on all such points James Anthony Froude's practical summing up and decision is to be taken as mine. The imperfect copy of the said manuscript, which is among my papers with the original letters, I give to my niece Mary Carlyle Aitken, to whom also, dear little soul, I bequeath 500*l.* for the loving care and unwearied patience and helpfulness she has shown to me in these my last solitary and infirm years. To her also I give at her choice whatever memorials of my dear departed one she has seen me silently preserving here, especially the table in the drawing-room at which I now write, and the little child's chair (in the china closet), which latter to my eyes has always a brightness as of Time's morning and a sadness as of death and eternity when I look on it, and which, with the other dear article, I have the weak wish to preserve in loving hands yet awhile when I am gone.' Referring to some of his manuscripts, Mr. Carlyle writes:—'Many or most of these papers I often feel that I myself should burn; but probably I never shall after all.' The will then provides in due legal form for the distribution of his estate among his relatives. In 1878 Mr. Carlyle executed a codicil to his will, making certain alterations which death had rendered necessary, and appointing Mr. Froude and Sir James Stephen his executors and trustees. His writing-table he bequeaths to Sir James Stephen, and adds:—'I know he will accept it as a distinguished mark of my esteem. He knows that it belonged to my honoured father-in-law and his daughter, and that I have written all my books upon it, except only "Schiller," and that for the fifty years and upwards that are now past I have considered it among the most precious of my possessions.' The will was proved on April 7, 1881, and the personalty sworn under 35,000*l.*

At the meeting of the Royal Geographical Society on Monday evening, Major-General Sir Henry Rawlinson, K.C.B., the Chairman, in opening the proceedings, announced the result of the Royal awards. To Major Serpa Pinto, who was proposed by Sir R. Alcock, and seconded by Sir H. Rawlinson, was awarded a gold medal for his remarkable journey across Africa, from Benguela to Natal, during which he explored nearly 500 miles of new country, defined the fluvial systems of the northern slopes of the Benguelan highlands, and fixed the position of numerous places by a series of astronomical observations; also for the admirable account of his journey, now in course of publication in London, containing numerous original maps, tables of observations, and a large amount of valuable and exact information regarding the African interior. To Mr. Benjamin Leigh Smith, proposed by Sir E. Ommaney, and seconded by Captain Evans, R.N., was also awarded a gold medal for having, in a steamer built and fitted at his own expense for the purpose of Arctic exploration, made important discoveries along the coast of Franz-Josef Land, and for his previous geographical work during three former expeditions, also equipped by himself, along the north-east land of Spitzbergen.

By Messrs. Sampson Low, Marston, & Co. : 'To the Central African Lakes and Back : the Narrative of the Royal Geographical Society's East Central African Expedition, 1878-80,' by Joseph Thomson, F.R.G.S., in two vols., with portraits and a map.

By Messrs. Macmillan & Co. : 'Voyage of the Vega,' by Adolph Erik Nordenskjold, with illustrations.

By Mr. J. Murray : 'Siberia in Europe,' a Naturalist's Visit to the Valley of the Petchora in North-East Russia, with Descriptions of Birds and their Migrations, by Henry Seebohm, F.Z.S., F.L.S., F.R.G.S. ; 'A Handbook for Travellers in Bengal, from Calcutta to Jaghernaut on the West, Allahabad on the North, and Rangoon on the East,' by E. By Messrs. Sonnenschein & Allen : 'The Great Desert of Sahara,' by Donald Mackenzie ; 'Scanderia ; or, Round the Delta,' by John Archibald.

By Messrs. Trübner & Co. : 'Memoirs of the Survey of Western Palestine,' issued under the direction of the Committee of the Palestine Exploration Fund, in six to eight volumes, with maps, &c.

By Messrs. Vizetelly & Co. : 'America Revisited,' by George Augustus Sala, illustrated.

Messrs. Sampson Low & Co. are about to publish a book by Mr. Carl Bock, the Borneo explorer, entitled the 'Head-Hunters of Borneo,' giving the result of his zoological and ethnographical researches in Borneo and in Sumatra, which he also visited. The work will be copiously illustrated with coloured plates and engravings from the author's drawings. Mr. Bock, though a naturalised Englishman, is a native of Scandinavia, and his manuscript has been carefully revised by an English writer. He is well known as an authority on conchology.

The Clarendon Press will shortly issue the following classical and science works:— 'Sophocles,' Vol. II., with Notes and Introductions ; edited by Dr. Lewis Campbell. 'A Cycle of Celestial Objects,' by Admiral W. H. Smith, and revised by George T. Chambers, F.R.A.S. 'Loci e libro veritatum,' being passages selected from Gascoigne's Theological Dictionary, by Mr. James E. Thorold Rogers, M.P.

A society for the encouragement of Franco-Japanese literature has been started in Japan, and has commenced operations with 60 members. One of its first duties is to be the compilation of a Franco-Japanese dictionary.

The Committee of the Carlyle Memorial Fund state that they have already received about 600*l.* for the purpose of erecting a statue of Mr. Carlyle on the Chelsea Embankment, and of placing a bust in Westminster Abbey. The cost of the memorial is estimated at about 2,500*l.* A subscription list has been opened at Messrs. Drummonds' Bank, and the Rev. Gerald Blunt, the Rectory, Chelsea, and M. A. B. Mitford, 100 Cheyne Walk, Chelsea, the Hon. Secs., will be happy to receive any donations.

A reprint of Lord Cairns' speech on the Transvaal peace, 'corrected on authority,' has been published by the National Union of Conservative and Constitutional Associations. It bears the title of 'Peace with Dishonour.'

Mr. Clements R. Markham is engaged in preparing a memoir reviewing the work of the Royal Geographical Society since its foundation in 1830. It will form part of the fiftieth volume of the Society's Journal, and will also be printed separately.

Mr. Beal is preparing a new edition of the 'Travels of Fa-hien and Sung-yun,' from the Chinese. The first edition of this work has been out of print for some time. Mr. Beal proposes to introduce into his preface a *précis* of I-tsing's history of fifty-six Chinese Buddhist priests who visited India during the early part of the T'ang dynasty.

According to our contemporary *Paper and Print*, Mr. Hansard is about to retire from the trusteeship of the Printers' Pension Corporation.

In a day when Russia is entering on what may prove to be a new phase of her history, English readers and thinkers will welcome the opportunity which is to be afforded to them at the Royal Institution of gaining some knowledge of the national writers of the great empire. Mr. E. C. Turner, who fills the office of Lector at the University of St. Petersburg, is to give five lectures on the Great Modern Writers of Russia, in Albemarle Street, on the last two Saturdays in May and the first three Saturdays in June. Among the subjects announced for the Friday evening discourses we notice the Language and Literature of the Scottish Highlands, on which Professor Blackie, to whom it will prove a congenial topic, is to discourse.

Mr. John Gould's valuable ornithological library, a collection of rare interest, will come to the hammer at Messrs. Puttick & Simpson's on the 22nd inst.

Messrs. Puttick & Simpson's sale of Tuesday included a collection of books relating to John Clare, the Northampton peasant poet, and his patron, Admiral Lord Radstock, formerly in Mrs. Eliza L. Emmerson's library.

Archæology and ecclesiology seem to be in the ascendant in the serial literature of the day, for in addition to the monthlies, the *Antiquarian* and the *Sacristy*, Messrs. Bemrose & Sons have just published the *Reliquary*, which is to be issued quarterly.

Some unpublished letters of Dr. Johnson are promised in *Notes and Queries* of next Saturday.

The plan of giving prizes, open to all competitors, for literary work seems to be daily growing in popularity, and our friends north of the Tweed are making large ventures in this direction. The proprietors of the *People's Friend*, published at Dundee, offer the considerable honorarium of 100*l.* for the best original serial story submitted to them by the 1st of December next.

Another provincial newspaper proprietor and editor is added to the roll of the House of Commons by the election of Mr. Alderman Storey for Sunderland, in the room of Sir Henry Havelock-Allan.

A new work will shortly appear on 'Slavery and the Slave Trade in Egypt and the Soudan,' which will contain a large number of unpublished letters by Colonel Gordon to his sister during his Governor-Generalship of the Soudan. The work is edited by Mr. G. B. Hill.

The sum of 1,400*l.* has now been received towards the memorial to the late Rev. Dr. Norman Macleod, chaplain to the Queen and editor of *Good Words*, and the committee has decided to erect upon a pedestal in Cathedral Square, near the Barony Church, Glasgow, a bronze statue of Dr. Macleod. It will be unveiled in September next.

The *Athenæum* says that the Prime Minister has made a grant of 50*l.* to the artisan poet Mr. Joseph Teenan, of East Linton, who is said to be suffering from paralysis. He is the author of 'Contributions in Verse' and 'Song and Satire,' unpretending verses, reprinted chiefly from the *Scotsman* and other Scotch papers.

The revised version of the New Testament is not only the joint property of the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge, but the editions of the version issued by the two University Presses are identical in every respect, except in regard to the word 'Oxford' or 'Cambridge' on the title-pages. The type, form, binding, and price are the same.

Messrs. T. & T. Clark, of Edinburgh, will shortly publish the first issue for the present year of their 'Foreign Theological Library.' It will comprise Professor Godet's 'Commentary on the Romans,' Vol. II., and Professor Dorner's 'System of Christian Doctrine,' Vol. II.

The 'Life of Bishop Macilvaine,' by Rev. Canon Carus, is in the press, and will be issued shortly by Mr. Elliot Stock.

The 'Life of the Rev. J. M. Phillipo, late Missionary in Jamaica,' written by Dr. Underhill, Honorary Secretary of the Baptist Missionary Society, is now in the press, and will be issued during the present month by Messrs. Yates & Alexander.

Messrs. Baker & Sons, publishers and foreign importers of Clifton, have sent us a few samples of coloured prints which they are selling at a very low price. They are copies of celebrated paintings by the ancient and modern masters, and are entitled 'Facsimile Light Pictures.'

The Earl of Rosebery, Lord Rector of the University of Edinburgh, has signified his intention of offering a prize of 20 guineas annually during his tenure of office for the best essay on an historical subject. The following is announced to be the subject for the present year:—'The Ecclesiastical System of Scotland immediately before the Reformation.'

The Rev. Charles Taylor, M.A., who was on Monday elected Master of St. John's College, Cambridge, has done good literary work in several departments. In 1867 he was the successful candidate for the Kaye prize, the subject of the essay being 'The Gospel in the Law: a critical examination of the citations from the Old Testament and the New.' On the essay being published it was pronounced by sound critics to be a remarkable work, distinguished by its fairness and fulness of scholarly discussion, while it gave unmistakable proof of careful research. The next remarkable work he published was in 1877—'Sayings of the Jewish Fathers, including Pirke Aboth, &c., in Hebrew and English, with critical and illustrative notes.' The issue of this work raised Mr. Taylor to the front rank among Hebraists, and it has been said of this publication by an eminent Hebrew scholar that 'since the Buxtorfs no Christian has written a book of such value.' In addition, however, to Mr. Taylor's contributions to Hebraic literature he has done excellent service to the mathematical world by the recent publication of his 'Introduction to the Ancient and Modern Geometry of Conics.' Besides these works, he is a contributor to the transactions of the Cambridge Philological Society, and is joint-editor of the *Messenger of Mathematics*.

### BOOKS RECEIVED :—

From the **Bazaar Office.**—'Fancy Pigeons: containing full directions for their breeding and management, with descriptions of every known variety and all other information of interest or use to pigeon fanciers.' By James C. Lyell. A comprehensive treatise on all the varieties of the fancy pigeon family and on the methods of rearing and managing them. The book is copiously illustrated with well-drawn plates of the birds, and it may be commended to all who devote themselves to this harmless and pretty 'fancy.'

From **Messrs. Carswell & Co., Edinburgh.**—'The Law of the Road ; or, the Wrongs and Rights of a Traveller,' by R. Vashon Rogers, jun., Barrister-at-Law. A work by a Canadian author, supplying for the use of ordinary readers an epitome of the law in England, the United States, and Canada, as to the rights, liabilities, and responsibilities of carriers and passengers by car, stage, and private conveyances. The work, which seems to have had an extensive sale across the Atlantic, both in the Dominion and in the United States, delicately veils its legal information under a variety of experiences of real life, under every form of accident and inconvenience caused by traffic on road, rail, and sea. The legal authorities, which are profusely quoted, are given in footnotes to what is in effect an amusing record of possible encounters with almost every form of

mishap. The style of the book is essentially American, but it deals with all varieties of accidents and the legal remedies which may be secured. There is an excellent index, which materially increases the value of the book.

From **Messrs. Dean & Son.**—'The Export Merchant Shippers of London, Manchester, Liverpool, Birmingham, Wolverhampton, Walsall, Leeds, Bradford, Sheffield, Glasgow, Greenock, Edinburgh, Leith, Hull, Newcastle-on-Tyne, Stockton-on-Tees, Middlesborough, West Hartlepool, Gateshead, Sunderland, North and South Shields, Bristol, and Cardiff, with their Trading Ports and Class of Goods they Ship,' edited by A Custom-House Employé. The new edition of this wonderfully comprehensive work for 1881 gives, under each city, the export merchant shippers, arranged in alphabetical order, with their addresses ; and the ports to which they ship and the class of goods shipped are printed in parallel columns. Following the list for each city is a classified list of the firms, arranged in the alphabetical order of the class of goods which they ship ; and then there is a second index, giving the names of the firms in alphabetical order under the places to which they ship. The volume also supplies a Manufacturers' Trade Directory, and it is not too much to say that it ought to find a place in every counting-house. For clearness of arrangement and practical usefulness it could scarcely be surpassed.



From **Messrs. Thomas De la Rue & Co.**—'The Factors of the Unsound Mind, with Special Reference to the Plea of Insanity in Criminal Cases and the Amendment of the Law,' by William A. Guy, M.B., F.R.C.P., F.R.S. The author of this work offers it as a contribution to the consideration of the plea of insanity in criminal cases, examined under the light thrown upon it by a careful study of the factors of the unsound mind. These factors, to which he invites attention in order, are illusion, delusion, dreams, somnambulism, delirium, incoherent speech and convulsive movements; the emotions, passions, and movements of the will; mixed causes of common occurrence; and religious mania. In the second part of his work he treats of the inferences to be drawn from the reasonings already advanced in regard to these various elements of insanity; and then he deals exhaustively with the punishment of the madman and the present state of the law and its possible amendment. The aim of Mr. Guy's book is to secure such an amendment of the law relating to criminal cases as would 'dispense with all attempts to ascertain the state of the mind of the accused at the time of the act, with all questions bearing on his knowledge of right and wrong, and his appreciation of the nature and quality of the act, whatever that may mean'; and he would 'concentrate the attention of the court on the one plain question, Is the accused of unsound mind, and was he so about the time when the act was committed—that is to say, about the time when he may be assumed to have been contemplating it?' He 'would also no longer object to the plea of insanity being set up in the difficult cases of moral insanity and instinctive mania, the existence of which it is not possible to ignore.' The author also advocates the substitution of properly selected *experts*, or *skilled witnesses*, for witnesses put forward at the pleasure of the parties who organise the prosecution and defence, and a small number of such witnesses might, he suggests, be selected by the College of Physicians, or by any scientific association duly representing persons engaged in the care and treatment of the insane. The importance of the subject is so great that the work will doubtless attract attention outside the professional circle of lawyers and medical men.

From **Gall & Inglis.**—'First Geographical Reader for Standard II.' Edited by Thomas Morrison, M.A. This volume, which forms one of the publishers' 'British School Series,' is prepared in accordance with the idea which has been so prominently brought forward of late in connection with elementary education—that the reading lesson ought to be made the means of conveying to the pupil systematic instruction in general subjects. Here, for instance, we have a set of descriptive lessons in geography freely illustrated with maps and pictures, and setting before the pupil a large amount of information not only as to geographical definitions, but as to the growth of population, means of locomotion, variations of climate, the occupations of men, domestic animals, and other matters which, by giving a tolerably wide scope to the title of the work, may all be fairly included within it. The language used by the author is noteworthy for its clearness and simplicity, and the prominence given by the use of special type to the terms which his context explains renders the book still more easy of comprehension.

From **Mr. A. Gardner, Paisley.**—'Health Haunts of the Riviera.' This little work, by Dr. R. H. Story, of Rosneath, deals also with the places in the South of France which are resorted to by

invalids. The scope of the work will be best seen from the headings of the chapters—Cannes, Nice and Monte Carlo, Mentone, Bordighera and San Remo, Across the South of France, Pau, Lourdes, Biarritz, Arcachon and Dax. The following few words will have an interest for many readers:—

... Cette, the great emporium and factory of wines of all countries. They are doctored here to suit the various markets.

From **Messrs. Griffith & Farran.**—'The Churchman's Altar Manual and Guide to Holy Communion,' together with the Collects, Epistles, and Gospels, and a Selection of appropriate Hymns. A special feature of this book is the insertion of the Collects, Epistles, and Gospels for the Sundays and Holy Days, so that it forms in itself a complete companion to the Holy Communion, without the addition of a Prayer Book. The accompanying Prayers and Meditations are drawn from ancient sources, and the 'Preparation' is taken from the 'Imitation of Christ' of Thomas à Kempis. A word of praise must be given to the tasteful binding and the beautiful printing of the little volume.

From **Messrs. Abel Heywood & Sons.**—'The House of Commons.' A sixpenny pamphlet, giving a list of the constituencies in alphabetical order, with the names of the present members and their politics, the names of all candidates at the last general election, the votes polled in 1874, the number of registered voters in 1874 and 1880, the population at the last census, the areas of the boroughs and counties in square miles, the amount paid for property and income-tax and for inhabited house duty, the published expenses of each candidate at the last general election, and an alphabetical list of members. The result of every bye-election to the end of February is included.

From **Marshall Japp & Co.**—'Vivisection Scientifically and Ethically considered in Prize Essays.' By James Macaulay, A.M., M.D.; Rev. Brewin Grant, B.A.; and Abraham Wall, L.R.C.P. Few reformers, religious, political, or social, have worked with more genuine ardour and perseverance to attain their ends than the opponents of vivisection, and as one means of influencing public opinion they offered prizes for essays on the subject. The works of the successful competitors are here published in a goodly volume of more than three hundred pages, dealing with three questions: first, whether experiments in vivisection have been of any scientific value, or whether there are not fallacies underlying such a method of interrogating nature which of necessity vitiate the results; secondly, whether assuming for the sake of argument that such experiments are of scientific value or have led to the discovery of scientific facts of permanent importance, these discoveries could not have been arrived at by a broad and comprehensive study of natural phenomena or of those *quasi-natural* facts which are the continual accompaniments of civilisation, and if so, whether the latter method would have much retarded the dates of such discoveries; and thirdly, whether vivisection is morally justifiable, whether it does not tend to harden the operator and blunt his moral sense, and whether it is compatible with the moral government of the universe, so far as that can be inferred from the facts of nature. The prize offered was 200 guineas for the best essay: but as among the seven adjudicators there were two in favour of each of these essays, and the seventh did not like to decide the question, it was resolved

to divide the prize. The result is that we have three very able treatises instead of one, two of the authors being medical men (one of whom, Dr. Macaulay, is also editor of the *Leisure Hour*), and the third is a London clergyman well known as a skilled controversialist. The book is a complete storehouse not only of the whole history of the subject, but of the evidence, ancient and modern, which can be brought to bear against the vivisectionists.

From **Jarrold & Sons.**—'Notes of Lessons for Infant Classes and the First Standard.' By J. E. Singleton, F.R.G.S. A series of object and subject lessons for the younger classes in schools, well calculated to stimulate their faculties of intelligent observation and to train their minds for the reception of higher teaching. A glance at this book, in which the notes are so full that they need only be thoroughly mastered in order to qualify even a young pupil teacher to be of real service in a school, will be enough to prove that the art of teaching is no longer a *terra ignota* to our masters and mistresses, and with the aid of the models and objects which are to be found in nearly all well-furnished schools Mr. Singleton's manual will be of immense value. To parents also such a work as this may well be commended; for although educational reform has reached the masses of the people, and has effected a complete transformation in the arrangements for the instruction of their children, there are many homes in the middle and upper classes where such a system as that set forth in this book is wholly unknown. Every governess who has the responsible task of teaching in a private family would do well to study this book and fashion her lessons on its model.

From **Messrs. W. & A. K. Johnston.**—'Map of Asia.' A boldly planned and distinctly marked coloured map, set out on four sheets, each of them, roughly speaking, about  $3\frac{1}{2}$  feet by  $2\frac{1}{2}$  in area, the projection not Mercator's, but in imitation of a sphere; so that in the sweep of a map of Asia, Europe as far as Paris and London is included. This accidental circumstance, if we may call it so, greatly increases the usefulness of this map for reference, seeing that English people seldom think of Asia or Australia except in their relations to England.

From **Messrs. Crosby Lockwood & Co.**—'The German Prepositions, with the Cases they Govern, Exemplified in 2,500 useful Colloquial Phrases,' by Samuel Galindo. A most valuable little pocket volume, giving the exact meaning and force of the German prepositions, the varying sense of which differs so widely. The prepositions are classified according to the cases they govern, and the sentences are printed in German characters in one column, with the English equivalents opposite.

From the same.—'German Phraseology,' by Samuel Galindo. Another volume of the publishers' 'Elementary School Series,' giving in the old-fashioned form of conversational sentences exemplifications of all the rules of German grammar. The little book contains more than 2,500 German phrases, with their English translations. Notes are added wherever any points require explanation.

From **Messrs. Marshall Japp & Co.**—'Half-Holiday Hand-Books.' A series of booklets in crown octavo, of about 70 pages each, which pleasantly indicate the objects of interest which lie

within the reach of a walking rambler; the celebrated sites, beautiful views, public institutions, health-giving hills, commons, lanes, woods, &c. These hand-books distinguish themselves by the particular attention they devote to the birds, fishes, trees, and plants of each neighbourhood, with which the engravings are chiefly occupied. Dorking, Reigate, and Kingston-on-Thames are the numbers which have reached us.

From **Messrs. Morgan & Scott.**—'Heaven: its Hope, its Inhabitants, its Riches, its Happiness,' by D. L. Moody. A volume by the well-known American evangelist, who, with Mr. Sankey, has conducted mission services in London and other towns of this country. Mr. Moody tells us in the preface that this is the only book published with his authority, although many have been published in his name, so that it would appear that our cousins across the Atlantic deal as freely with the productions of their own countrymen as with those of English authors. The book is marked by all the richness of illustration and facility of expression which distinguished the author's addresses from the pulpit or the platform, and it is stocked with those anecdotes of what may be termed 'spiritual experiences' which formed so prominent a feature in Mr. Moody's preaching. The fervid exhortations with which each chapter abounds contain not a little of natural eloquence, and despite the Americanism of the style, the volume will find many willing readers in this country.

From the same.—'Life more Abundant, and other Addresses.' By Theodore Monod. A collection of addresses by the eminent French pastor, originally published from a shorthand writer's report in the *Christian*, and now reprinted after revision by the author. The aim of M. Monod may be gathered from the caution which he gives his readers 'against the common and perilous error of mistaking increase of light for increase of life; conviction for conversion; gratification for sanctification; knowing about Christ for knowing Christ.' Some of the addresses were delivered at the Mildmay Park Conferences, and others at Edinburgh and Dublin.

From **Newman & Co.**—'Lilian Adelaide Neilson. A Memorial Sketch, Personal and Critical.' By M. H. de Leine. Those who enjoyed the pleasure of witnessing the performances of Miss Neilson, and who were shocked by the tidings of her sudden death in Paris last autumn, will welcome this brief sketch of the talented young actress and the photograph which forms its frontispiece. Born in Queen's Square, Leeds, the daughter of a basket-maker, she was registered under the decidedly commonplace and just as decidedly English patronymic of Brown, and although her parentage remains in obscurity, she probably had gipsy blood in her veins. The present sketch is from the pen of a lady who met Miss Neilson in the Yorkshire village of which her husband's father was the pastor, and her bright presence and kindly manners seem to have won for her here an affection as general as the popularity which she acquired on the stage. Her dramatic career only lasted fifteen years—from 1865 to 1880—and it was, we are told, commenced at Margate, where she appeared as Julia in the 'Hunchback,' her first London performance being Juliet, a character which she made completely her own, at the Royalty Theatre, in 1865. The authoress briefly sketches her career, noting all the remarkable successes which she achieved, and the



volume closes with a brief record of her short illness in Paris and her funeral at Brompton Cemetery. The little book is written with admirable taste and delicacy of feeling.

**From the Religious Tract Society.**—'Saving Faith: What is it? A Scriptural Enquiry and Appeal.' By the Rev. Joseph Tanner, B.A. Third Edition. This little work, which seems to have acquired considerable popularity in the religious world, is divided under the two heads of 'The Scriptural Meaning of Believing in the Lord Jesus' and 'The Scriptural Meaning of being Born again.' Although dealing with an intricate question of theology, the book is clearly written, and puts the author's view thoroughly before the reader.

**From Mr. Walter Smith.**—'A Guide to the Churches of London and its Suburbs for 1881' (fifteenth year). By Charles Mackeson. The fifteenth edition of 'Mackeson's Guide,' published under the sanction of the Archbishop of Canterbury and the Bishops of London, Winchester, Rochester, St. Albans, and Bedford, supplies information as to 887 churches in London and within a radius of twelve miles, and, as it is a work of which the best idea may be given by summarising its contents, we give the following statistics compiled from it:—There is a daily celebration of the Holy Communion in 43 churches, or one in every twenty; weekly celebrations in 454, more than one-half; early celebration in 533, two-fifths; choral celebration in 128, one-seventh; and evening celebration in 267, nearly one-third. There is daily service in 256 churches, more than one-fourth; service on Saints' days in 433, nearly one-half; but 131 churches, nearly one-sixth, have no service on week days. The service is full choral in 303 churches, more than one-third—and partly choral in 283, nearly one-third; the choir is surpliced in 397, more than two-fifths; there is a paid choir in 211, nearly one-fourth; a voluntary choir in 376, three-sevenths; and the Gregorian Tones are used in 124, one seventh. There is weekly offertory from the whole congregation in 440 churches, one-half; the seats are free and open in 317, more than one-third. The surplice is worn in the pulpit in 581, two-thirds; the eucharistic vestments are adopted in 35, one church in every twenty-five; incense is used in 11; the altar candles are lighted at the Holy Communion in 54, one-sixteenth; the eastward position is taken by the celebrant in 234, more than one-fourth; and there are candles on the altar in 53 churches in addition to those where they are lighted. Floral decorations are the rule in 219 churches, one-fourth; and the Dedication Festival is kept at 156, more than one-sixth. One hundred and eleven churches are opened for private prayer; at 53 the Sunday services are separated, and at 91 the daily services are shortened in accordance with the Act of Uniformity Amendment Act.

**From Mr. E. Stanford.**—'Geographical Readers for Elementary Schools.' By Charlotte M. Mason. Book I. for Standard II. Elementary Geography. A book of simple reading lessons, conveying the chief facts of geography, with illustrations, questions, and poems suited to children in elementary schools. The subject is treated with much clearness and simplicity, and homely things are used to bring home the facts to the children's minds.

**From the same.**—'Loftie's Guide through London' contains an historical summary, notices of the principal objects of interest which may be seen in a few days, and gives lists of the principal hotels, theatres, and railway stations, besides notes which are likely to be useful to a sightseer. One of the advantages of Mr. Loftie's work is that a careful selection has been made of what may easily be seen by a tourist in the space of a week, thereby saving much trouble. At the same time directions are given to the names of fuller hand-books, in case of farther information being desired. A map and plans are given.

**From Mr. Elliot Stock.**—'The Communicant: A Manual of Devotion for Holy Communion.' Edited by W. O. Purton, Rector of Kingston-by-Sea. It is a common practice on the part of compilers of books of devotion for the use of communicants to go to a variety of ancient sources for prayers, hymns, and meditations, but in this case the editor has, while drawing upon an equally wide field for his selections, secured original contributions by living writers. The authors whose aid he has obtained include the most prominent of the Evangelical clergy, the Bishops of Liverpool and Sodor and Man, the Dean of Chester, Canon Bernard, Canon Clayton, Prebendary Cadman, Dr. Flavel Cook, Canon Elliott, Canon Powell Jones, Canon Scott-Moncreiff, and Archdeacon Whately. The work is divided into five sections: an introductory chapter on the Institution of the Lord's Supper; a series of meditations and prayers preparatory to the act of communion; the text of the post-communion office from the Prayer Book with accompanying prayers and meditations followed by a selection of eucharistic hymns by Wesley, Bonar, E. H. Bickersteth, and one or two translations from the German; thanksgivings to be used after communicating; and notes on sacrifice. It will thus be seen that the plan of the work is very complete, and although it is another contribution to a field already well occupied, the fact that it supplies original matter by well-known writers will give it at once a claim to attentive consideration.



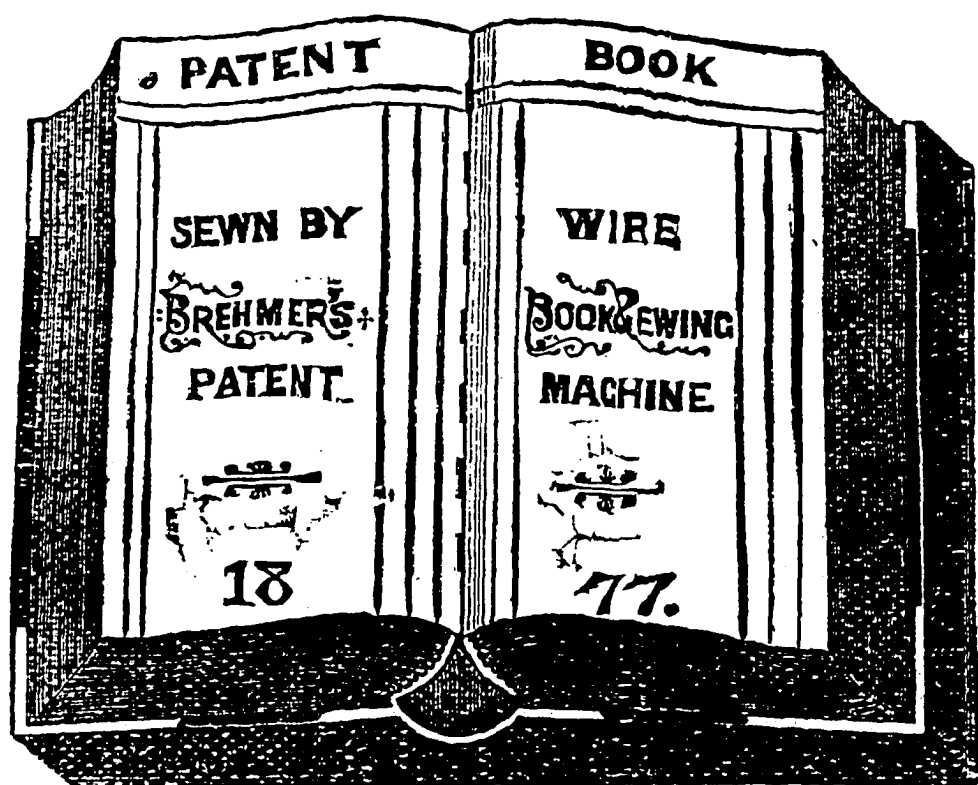
