WHATEVER may be the ultimate issue of the attack upon the ancient Guilds of the City of London—and we can scarcely believe that any English Government will lend itself to the wild and destructive schemes which have been suggested in some quarters—there can be no question as to the desirability of removing any legitimate grounds of complaint as to their administration before an attempt is made to injure them. Reform from within is the best possible safeguard against violence from without, and the most effective argument which can be advanced by the defenders of these time-honoured institutions is to show that they still have a distinct *raison d'être*, and that they are willing to act on any friendly suggestions which would increase their usefulness. In many cases, although they are still doing valuable work, the Companies have drifted a long way from their original intentions, and have become practically dissociated from the trades and crafts with which they were connected at the time of their foundation; but this is very far from being universally the case, and the Goldsmiths' Company, the Turners' Company, and the Stationers' Company, may be instanced as maintaining an intimate relation to their own proper trades. The Stationers' Company, more largely perhaps than the majority of these corporations, consists of the members of the associated trades concerned in the production of paper and books, and the paper manufacturer, the printer, the stationer, the wholesale and retail bookseller, and the publisher, are all to be found enrolled in the livery, while the Court includes some of the most honoured names in the great firms devoted to these branches of national industry. While, however, this shows that the Stationers do not, like some other public bodies, take their title on the *lucus a non lucendo* principle, they have a further claim to consideration on practical grounds in the work which they perform as the official registrars under the Copyright Acts. The registry at the Hall on Ludgate Hill is doubtless a familiar spot to the majority of our readers, and it is with satisfaction that we hear of a disposition on the part of those who are charged with its management to increase its usefulness. From a period of considerable antiquity, as Mr. Arber's reprints of the ancient registers abundantly prove, the Register has been very largely used, as affording the only obtainable proof of copyright in title, and the importance of the registration is sufficiently certified by the fact that under the provisions of the Statute 5 and 6 Victoria, cap. 45, no alteration can be made in the Register, nor can any error be corrected, except by an order of the High Court of Justice, or one of the judges of the Court. While, however, the Register has been largely resorted to, it can scarcely be said that it has supplied an exact *quid pro quo* to the public for the fees which have been paid into its treasury; and, as those who have made the attempt are doubtless aware, a search at Stationers' Hall has been a matter of far greater difficulty than a search for a book at the British Museum Library, or for the certificate of a birth, marriage, death, or will at Somerset House. To improve the system, and, by careful classification of entries and efficient indexing, to make the Register really available for reference, has long been a consummation devoutly wished for by many literary men, and, judging from the circulars issued within the last few months to inquirers at the Hall, the desired end seems to be at last within reach. These circulars, of which copies are before us, are three in number, and specify, with something like legal exactness of terminology, the conditions for registration of (a) books; (b) dramatic pieces and musical compositions; and (c) fine-art works; and if, as we imagine will be the case, separate registers are kept for these three classes of productions, the task of tracing out any particular title will be materially facilitated. With an improved method of working, the Copyright Registry at Stationers' Hall may be made of infinite value to literary men and to the trade, and if the sharp practice of gentlemen who register dummy volumes as published books—thus evading the plainly stated rule that 'no book can be registered before it is published'—is checked, as it deserves to be, the benefit conferred will be largely increased. It will be a pleasant recollection for Mr. Joseph Johnson Miles, the present 'Worshipful Master,' that during his tenure of the Chair, which gives what may be regarded as the blue ribbon of the trade to its occupant, a reform of procedure has been initiated, and the ability and energy of the clerk to the Company, Mr. C. R. Rivington, are sufficient to justify the hope that no efforts will be spared to carry it out, with a due regard for the public interest.

The Report of the Committee of the School Board for London, appointed to consider the working of the Store Department in the supply of books and *matériel* to the various schools, of which an abstract was given in our last issue, was presented for adoption at the full meeting of the Board on Wednesday. Mr. Mark Wilks, in moving that the recommendation of the Committee in favour of maintaining the Store should be adopted, urged that the Report gave a full and complete answer to the charges brought against the management of the Store Department; but the Rev. C. Lawrence moved as an amendment that the Report should be referred back to the Committee for a statement of the reforms which it suggested might be adopted; and so clear was the division of opinion that eighteen voted for the amendment, and eighteen against it, the Chairman (Mr. Buxton) giving his casting vote against the amendment. The Board then proceeded to discuss the first recommendation of the Committee: that the supply of books &c. through the Store should be continued—but this was met by a motion of 'the previous question,' and ultimately the debate was adjourned. Mr. Mark Wilks intimated that in all probability a statement of the reforms which the Committee recommend would be placed in the hands of the Board during the ensuing week, and if this is the case all the facts will be before the members when they resume the discussion.

It has been decided that the new contracts for the bookwork printing required for the public service in England—to come into operation on January 1, 1887, and to include, in accordance with resolutions passed by the House of Lords and House of Commons in 1882, ordinary parliamentary printing, with other Government work of the kind—shall be submitted to open competition. The ordinary 'bookwork printing' for Parliament and offices in London will, for the purposes of the new contracts, subject to future possible modifications of detail, be divided into six groups, as follow:—Contract A. Printing ordered by either House of Parliament, with the exception of bills for both Houses, the minutes of proceedings and journals of the House of Lords, and the votes, proceedings, and journals of the House of Commons. B. Printing for the Treasury, the offices of the Secretaries of State for the Home Department, the Colonies, and India, for Royal Commissions, and for the Council-office. C. Printing for other offices in Whitehall or the immediate neighbourhood, with the exception of Provisional Orders. D. Printing for the Admiralty and War-office, with their dependent branches. E. Printing for the offices located in Somerset House, for the Public Record-office, and (with some small exceptions) for the High Court of Justice. F. Printing for the offices located in the East-end of London—viz., the Post-office, Customs, Patent-office, &c. The conditions of the several contracts will be published at the same time, probably early in the year 1885. The dates for receiving tenders for the several groups—commencing on or about November 1, 1885—will be fixed at intervals of three weeks, in order that an opportunity may be afforded after each competition for unsuccessful competitors to reconsider their position and bid, if they are inclined to do so, for the other contracts.

The funeral of the late Mr. Spottiswoode took place on Thursday, the 5th inst., in Westminster Abbey. The coffin was covered with magnificent wreaths and immortelles, and there was a large attendance of noblemen and gentlemen distinguished in politics, science, art, and literature. The pall-bearers were Lord Salisbury, representing Oxford University; Lord Granville, London University; Sir William Siemens, the British Association; Sir Frederick Leighton, the Royal Academy; Sir John Lubbock, the Royal Linnean Society; Sir Bartle Frere, the Royal Asiatic Society; Sir William Armstrong, the Institution of Civil Engineers; Dr. Evans, the Royal Society; Mr. Childers, Her Majesty's Government; the Duke of Northumberland, the Royal Institution; the Master of the Stationers' Company; Lord Aberdare, the Royal Geographical Society; Mr. C. Busk, the Royal Astronomical Society; Professor Flower, the Royal Zoological Society; also Mr. Shinn, Mr. Millwood, Mr. Carey, Mr. Straker, and Mr. Hamilton, representing departments in Her Majesty's printing office; and Mr. Wm. Wilson, representing the office of Messrs. Spottiswoode & Co. Mr. Andrew Cockerell represented the Prince of Wales. The principal mourners were Mr. George Spottiswoode (the brother of the deceased), Mrs. Spottiswoode (the deceased's widow), and two sons; and amongst others present were Mr. W. H. Smith, Professor Tyndall, Professor Huxley, Sir Charles Dilke, Mr. Shaw Lefevre, Mr. Mundella, Dr. Carpenter, Sir Frederick Bramwell, Mr. Forster, Sir Richard Temple, Sir Joseph Hooker, Sir Richard Cross, Mr. Henry Irving, Professor Cayley, Professor Sylvester, Sir F. Pollock, the Archbishop of York, Professor Leone Levi, Sir Rutherford Alcock, and the Wardens of the Stationers' Company. About 500 employes of Messrs. Spottiswoode, and a company of the 2nd City of London Rifle Regiment Volunteers, in which others are serving, lined the nave, while twenty men standing with arms reversed formed a guard at the entrance to the cloisters. The coffin, which was of plain oak, bore the inscription: 'William Spottiswoode, born January 11th, 1825; died June 27th, 1883.' The grave is situated in the north-eastern portion of the south transept, and near the remains of the deceased's ancestor, Archbishop Spottiswood.

Mr. Rivers, of Queen's Head Passage, has sent us his new catalogue of second-hand works. No less than 32 pages of it are devoted to books and scarce tracts on India. Africa, America, Australia, China, and other prominent divisions of the world are largely represented.

Messrs. Shaw, of the Victoria printing works, Mossley, have sent us their pamphlet of specimen work in ornamental and colour printing, which gives evidence of great painstaking. Some of the combinations are very pretty.

A meeting of creditors of Mr. William Hunt, bookseller, of Ipswich, was held on the 19th ult. at the Cannon Street Hotel, Mr. W. L. Passmore, of the firm of Messrs. Williams, Cooper, & Co., being in the chair. A statement of affairs was set forth, showing liabilities £19,251. 12s. 7d., which included creditors fully secured £3,102. 9s., and those partially secured £6,194. 6s. 6d.—about £16,700 of the liabilities represented borrowed money from bankers and others; the actual trade creditors being limited. The assets were estimated to yield £12,758. 6s. 9d. The debtor attributed his insolvency to losses in the publication of *Evening Hours*, to two dishonest clerks at Ipswich, his association in partnership in London with Mr. William Macintosh and Mr. Bailey, and to the bad state of trade owing to agricultural depression. There being no offer of composition it was determined to liquidate the estate by arrangement, Mr. J. F. Titchmarsh being appointed trustee with a committee of inspection.

The sale of the Beckford Library is still in progress. We shall give a summary of its chief 'events' in our next issue.

Professor Huxley succeeds Mr. Spottiswoode as President of the Royal Society.

The *Edinburgh Review*, which is to be published to-morrow, will contain articles on 'The Ancient, Mediæval, and Modern Stage,' on 'The Angler's Library,' and 'Snakes.'

Mr. Murray proposes to issue a complete edition of Dean Stanley's works, in monthly volumes. It is to be hoped that the late Dean's fugitive lectures, some of which were published as pamphlets, will be included in the series.

Christmas Cards are to form a *spécialité* in the next Printing Exhibition at the Agricultural Hall.

Messrs. Sampson Low & Co. have published two new volumes of their 'Biographies of Great Musicians:—'Mozart,' by Dr. Gehring, and 'Handel,' by Mrs. Julian Marshall.

Messrs. Collingridge, in a letter to the *St. James's Gazette*, in reference to the action of Mr. Robarts, late City Remembrancer, for libel against the *City Press*, state that it was only at the urgent request of the other side that they did not press on the case. Mr. Robarts has now abandoned the proceedings and paid the costs.

Messrs. Wells Gardner, Darton, & Co. have in the press two new works by the Bishop of Truro and the Bishop of Bedford. Dr. Wilkinson's volume is entitled 'The Chastening of the Lord,' and Dr. Walsham How's consists of the Lectures on Pastoral Work, which he delivered at Cambridge last term.

The new Constitutional and Church penny newspaper, *The Banner*, is to be published next week under the editorship of Mr. Charles Mackeson. The office is in Tavistock Street, Covent Garden. The company which issues *The Banner* has for its directors the Master of Magdalene College, Cambridge (the Rev. the Hon. L. Neville), the Right Hon. H. Cecil Raikes, M.P., Mr. Stanley Leighton, M.P., Mr. H. T. Davenport, M.P., Mr. Gilliat (Governor of the Bank of England), and Mr. George Bell. The scheme has, we hear, received the adhesion of nearly all the leading Conservatives, and the paper has already a strong list of subscribers who have pledged themselves not only to a subscription for two years, but to use every effort to promote the success of the venture.

By a clerical error in a paragraph in our last number, Mr. Cornelius Walford was described as the editor of the *Antiquarian Magazine and Bibliographer*, the serial edited by his cousin, Mr. Edward Walford, M.A. The scheme for the 'Dictionary of Periodical Literature' referred to in the same paragraph as projected by Mr. Cornelius Walford, is being published in Mr. Elliot Stock's serial, the *Bibliographer*.

The *Quarterly Review* is promised for Wednesday. Its political article is on 'The Future of Parties and Politics.' It will contain several papers of literary interest, including 'Dean Swift in Ireland,' the 'Real Lord Byron,' and 'English Literature.'

Mr. Charles Kent writes to the *Athenæum* to point out that the arrangement of Lamb's Poems in chronological order by Mr. Ainger in his forthcoming edition will not be a novelty. Mr. Kent, in his centenary edition of Lamb's works, published in 1875, placed the poems in order of date.

An analysis of a poem entitled *The Rest of Don Juan*, by an American named Morford, is given by Mr. H. S. Aslebee in an article which appears in the July number of the *Bibliographer*. This continuation of Byron's poem is unnoticed by Allibone, who is usually careful to register every American author.

The July number of the *Antiquary* contains an article by Mr. W. Brailsford on a transitional period of ancient armour, in which the author shows the influence of the Wars of the Roses upon the fashion of armour.

A little book called 'The Book Lover's Enchiridion,' containing choice passages in praise of books and reading, compiled from a number of English and American authors, was lately published in this country and was readily sold, although book-lovers generally complained of the extreme smallness of the type that was used in it. Messrs. J. B. Lippincott & Co., of Philadelphia and London, have an American edition of this book now in press, with revisions and additions, which will be brought out in handsome large type, and in a style of paper, press-work, and binding that is to surpass even the exquisite get-up of the original English edition.

The August issue of *Harper's Magazine* will have for its frontispiece an engraving from a picture by Mr. E. A. Abbey, illustrating 'A Town Garden.' A timely topic, 'The Modern Yacht,' will be treated in this number by Lieut. J. D. J. Kelley.

Messrs. Sampson Low & Co. have just published the third volume of the 'History of the Civil War in America,' by the Comte de Paris. This volume embraces, without abridgment, the fifth and sixth volumes of the French edition, and treats of the army of the Potomac in the East and the army of the Cumberland in the West during the year 1863.

Re JONES, E., & SON, Cardiff.—At the second general meeting of creditors held herein, Monday last the 9th inst., at the offices of Messrs. Nichols & Leatherdale, the debtor stated he was unable to find any security for the payment of 5s. in the pound, as he had hoped. There being no other alternative, liquidation of the estate was resolved on, Messrs. Leatherdale & Jenkins being joint trustees, the committee of inspection consisting of E. G. Astle and B. Lewis of Cardiff, and Mr. Harvey, Mr. B. Passmore, and John Maxwell of London. The committee have authorised the trustees to offer their stock and book debts for public tender.

OBITUARY.

The Right Rev. John William Colenso, D.D., Bishop of Natal, who died at Durban on the 20th ult., the scene of his long and active labours, is chiefly known by the controversy which arose on the publication of his work on 'The Pentateuch and Book of Joshua.' But aside from his views regarding the authenticity of these books, which were directly at variance with those held by orthodox Christians, Bishop Colenso must be acknowledged to have led a very useful life among the natives of his African home. He established schools among them, instructed them in the arts and practices of civilised life, and sought to defend them against the unjust aggressions of the colonists. He was born at St. Austell, Cornwall, in 1814, and graduated with honours in 1836 from St. John's College, Cambridge, of which he afterwards became a Fellow. Two years later he was made Mathematical Master at Harrow, holding that post until 1842. During that time he wrote and compiled his books on arithmetic and algebra, which became quite famous. In 1846 he was appointed Rector of Fornsett St. Mary, in Norfolk, where he continued until 1853, when he was made D.D., and appointed to the bishopric of the colony of Natal. His services among the Zulus have been very great, and among his later works were a Zulu grammar, dictionary, and translation of the New Testament.

The death is announced, at Leith, of Mr. William Scott Douglas, of Edinburgh. The deceased gentleman had devoted much attention to the life and works of Robert Burns, and was the editor of the fine edition of the poet's works published in six volumes by Mr. W. Paterson, of Edinburgh. He also edited a new and recent issue of Lockhart's life of the poet.

The death is announced of the Rev. Charles T. Brooks, at his home in Newport, Rhode Island, U.S.A., on the 14th. He was born in Salem, Mass., U.S., June 20, 1813. After graduating from Harvard, Mr. Brooks became pastor of the Unitarian Church at Newport, in 1837, on which occasion Dr. Channing preached the ordination sermon. Mr. Brooks had, however, left the pulpit for many years, and devoted himself to literature. He was an accomplished student of the German language and literature, and was distinguished for his translations from that tongue, among them being Schiller's 'William Tell,' 'Mary Stuart,' and 'The Maid of Orleans'; Jean Paul Richter's 'Titan'; 'Specimens of German Song'; with miscellaneous pieces from Rückert, Freiligrath, and other German poets. He also published, as original works, 'Songs of Field and Flood,' and 'Eight Months on the Ocean and Eight Weeks in India.'

Under the will of the late Mr. Ashton Wentworth Dilke, the residue of his real and personal estate, including the *Weekly Dispatch* newspaper, his share in the *Referee* newspaper, and his printing business, all of which his executor is fully empowered to carry on, is to be held upon trust for his children, in equal shares.

We have also to record the sudden death on the 28th ult. of Henry Francis Turle, the editor of *Notes and Queries*. His devotion to the work, which he had carried on since Dr. Doran's death, is well known to all the readers of that periodical.

BOOKS RECEIVED:—

From Messrs. W. H. Allen & Co.—'Eminent Women Series, No. 3, George Sand,' by Bertha Thomas. The contents of this interesting monograph are thus divided: Early years; childhood and married life; *début* in literature; Lelia, Italian journey; mental development; solitude, society, and socialism; Consuelo; Nohant; novelist and politician; pastoral tales; plays and later novels; artist and moralist; later years. The author says: 'Much (of authentic material) though of interest in itself, must here be omitted, as beyond the scope of the present study.' Still, room has been found for illustrative extracts from letters to literary contemporaries, more especially to Flaubert. Apart from its obvious value as an introduction to the works of Madame Dudevant, the new volume of 'Eminent Women' will be valuable to many a reader as briefly indicating the characteristics of her famous novels.

From Messrs. William Blackwood & Sons.—'Historical Readers.' Books I., II., and III. Edited by Professor Meiklejohn. These Readers which have been prepared as a part of the Publishers' 'Educational Series' are intended to meet the requirements of the New Code and the Instructions to H.M. Inspectors. The first volume deals with the History of England from the earliest period to 1154; the second dates from the Plantagenets to the House of Tudor; and the third treats of the reigns of the Houses of Stuart and Hanover. The chapters are divided into paragraphs, each with a subject side-head in prominent type, and a glossary closes every section. Verse connected with the subject in hand follows the prose and pictures, and maps are freely interspersed throughout the pages. Professor Meiklejohn has done his work admirably, and in conjunction with the actual historical record contrives to throw in a large amount of useful explanatory matter. He concludes with the following valuable little homily on the duty of Englishmen:—

We have seen England and Great Britain growing larger and larger, stronger and stronger, more and more free, more and more intelligent, until our Empire has risen to be the greatest, most powerful, and most respected upon the face of the globe. Every living Englishman may well be proud of his country, and may well do something to help her. 'But how can I help her?' one may say. 'I am poor, unknown, not by any means great, and without any prospect of doing more in this world than earning my daily bread.' The reply is: Everyone can help England. The nation is made up of units—of single persons; and the man, woman, or child, who lives an honest and upright life, doing always his best, fearing God and loving his fellow-man, does as much to build up the strong edifice of England's prosperity as the greatest statesman that ever lived. Each has his duty to do, he can do no more; he should do no less. Nelson and his men only did their duty when they saved England from the attacks of France and Spain; we can do as much if we save ourselves and those we know from the attacks of idleness and wrong-doing, or dissipation. We must also learn to love our country; to love the great men who have worked, and fought, and died for her; and to love those good and gentle men and women who have shown us in real life what true Christian patience, gentleness,

and clear-sightedness really are. We must learn to love our country for what she has been in the past, and for what she is now, for what she is destined to become in the great future that lies before her. And thus we shall gradually come to feel with England's greatest living poet, who says:

'Love thou thy land with love far-brought
From out the storied Past, and used
Within the Present, but transferred
Through future time by power of thought.'

The books are clearly printed and strongly bound.

From Mr. L. Upcott Gill.—'A Tour in the States and Canada, Out and Home in Six Weeks,' by Thomas Greenwood. Illustrated. As six weeks is a period within the reach of a large number of tourists, Mr. Greenwood's book reaches us at a convenient moment and may be turned to practical account by any of our readers who are disposed to venture across the Atlantic. We quite agree with him that many business men to whom the complete change of a sojourn in the States and in the Dominion would be a genuine restorative, are unaware of the ease with which in six weeks they may compass enough sight-seeing to render the effort really worth making, and his example might be followed with advantage. He went out in a Cunard steamer, and as to the cost of passage and all needful details, including even the bills of fare provided for the passengers, he gives full and complete information. The hotels and hotel life across the water are similarly described, and then he starts on his journey, giving an interesting though necessarily brief sketch of New York, a trip up the Hudson, Boston, Montreal, the Falls, Quebec and Ottawa, Toronto, Buffalo, Chicago, Cincinnati, St. Louis, Richmond, Washington, Philadelphia, and many other places. Having dealt with all these 'centres,' each, as he shows, with many points of interest, he gives several readable chapters on the local manufactures and closes with some advice on emigration and pages of tariffs and tables of distances. It is a very comprehensive and well-arranged little book full of really useful matter.

From Messrs. Griffith & Farran.—'The Parish Priest's Day Book: an index showing work done in Church and Parish,' by the Rev. Edward Collett. A little book in the size and shape of an ordinary bank cheque-book, giving manuscript pages neatly ruled for the entry of all duties performed by the clergy in their parochial ministrations. The book makes provision for fifty-two weeks, each week having a page and each day a line, the headings under which the figures can be entered including communion of the sick, private baptisms, number of visits, cottage lectures, classes, amount of alms given out, number present at day schools and Sunday schools, guilds, vestry meetings, missionary meetings, and other useful points. The idea is a good one, and to clergymen who have a taste for the methodical registration of work done it will be exceedingly welcome.

From Messrs. Griffith & Farran.—'Talks about Plants; or, Early Lessons in Botany,' by Mrs. Lankester. A new and cheaper edition of Mrs. Lankester's admirable book, to which we have already given high praise. The plan of the book is to treat of the plants as they come from month to month; 'Granny,' who tells the story, having for her companions Alice and Henry, whose suggestive remarks are judiciously arranged to draw out the knowledge of the benevolently communicative old lady. The illustrations, including six coloured plates, are pretty, and the book is well fitted for present or prize.

From the Great Eastern Railway Guides' Office.—'Tourist's Guide to the Continent,' by Percy Lindley. This is the fifth annual issue of a pleasant little epitome of the 'grand tour.' It is illustrated by plates in sepia, and by photo etchings, numerous enough to give a fair idea of what the traveller may expect to see in Holland, Belgium, Germany, and Switzerland. The most famous sites, the most remarkable buildings, the most noteworthy objects, costumes, and even customs are depicted. We miss Italy from the scheme of a handbook which is sufficiently comprehensive, but this is compensated for by fuller attention to nearer countries. Thus Holland, especially the interesting region about the Zuyder-Zee, has a large share of attention. Anglers will be glad to be reminded of the Ardennes, which, besides their attractions of wood and undulating hills, form a region of swiftly running streams. A great point is that the localities so agreeably laid before us by Mr. Percy Lindley are quickly reached from London.

From Messrs. Houghton, Mifflin, & Co. (Boston, U.S.A.)—'Daniel Webster,' by Henry Cabot Lodge. This volume is one of a series of biographies of American Statesmen, which, apart from their strong personal interest for all who were acquainted with the subjects of the different volumes, are calculated to throw much light upon the political history of the United States. A man of high moral tone, gifted with very considerable powers of eloquence, and prominently associated with all the great movements of his day, the life of Webster was well worthy writing, and it forms a highly interesting volume.

From Mr. A. Johnston.—'The History of a Lump of Chalk: its family circle and their uses,' by Alexander Watt. The author of this little book published some time since a kindred volume entitled 'A Lump of Coal,' and all who read it with its budget of valuable information attractively set forth will welcome this as a worthy companion to it. Mr. Watt deals first with the nature and composition of chalk; next he gives a geological sketch of the cretaceous ages; then he describes the chalk formations of the Thames Basin, Kent and Surrey; and in the after chapters he describes fully what he terms 'its family circle' in the various kindred substances, and closes with some interesting notes on the use of all these 'fruits of the earth' in the arts, manufacture, and agriculture. As a contribution to the science of common things such a popular treatise as this is of high value and should be widely read. It would form a capital text-book for a science class or a handbook to place before students attending science lectures.

From Mr. Henry Kimpton.—'The Mother's Guide—The Management and Feeding of Infants,' by Armand Semple, M.B. Cantab., M.R.C.P. The author of this manual treats of what the immortal bard styles 'the infant muling and puking in its nurse's arms,' up to the important

period when it has cut its teeth, or, to use the phraseology of the schools, up to the period of dentition. The book is based on an older treatise by Dr. Keating, and its information is so free from needless technicalities that mothers will find it of real help in rearing their offspring.

From Messrs. Crosby Lockwood & Co.—'Draining and Embanking: a Practical Treatise embodying the most recent experience in the application of Improved Methods,' by John Scott. Professor Scott puts this forth as the first of a series of volumes which will treat of draining and embanking, irrigation and water supply, roads and fences, farm-buildings, field implements and machinery, barn implements and machinery, and agricultural surveying. The failure of many systems of land drainage in past years completely justifies this attempt to deal exhaustively with the subject, and the numerous diagrams and full technical details will make the volume useful to all who have to undertake what must in any case be a very difficult task. Professor Scott admits in his preface that the character of the system adopted must vary according to the nature of the land, but as far as general principles and schemes are concerned he gives the most complete information.

From Mr. John Murray.—'The Handbook Dictionary.' The fuller title of this compact little work (which only measures $6\frac{1}{4} \times 3\frac{1}{2}$ inches, and is but an inch thick) is a 'Practical and Conversational Dictionary of the English, French, and German languages, in parallel columns, for travellers and students, by G. F. Chambers.' It meets a want which must continually be felt by those who are not familiar with continental languages, that of a book in which they can instantly learn the foreign equivalent for any English word which may occur. By means of the 'Handbook Dictionary' the traveller has at his command the German and French of more than 40,000 English words; two considerable dictionaries in one little book. The author says, in his preface:

I may venture to doubt whether a dictionary was ever before compiled and revised as this one has been, for every entry as to which the slightest uncertainty existed has been discussed *vis à vis* with Frenchmen and Germans respectively.

From Mr. T. Murby.—'The Insurance Blue-book and Guide to Fire Offices for 1883-4.' This useful publication has reached its eleventh year. It supplies, in addition to a directory of insurance companies and their offices, the life revenue accounts and balance sheets of the companies as required by Parliament to be lodged with the Board of Trade, and a host of other details connected with these great undertakings.

From Messrs. G. P. Putnam's Sons, New York.—'Handbook for Hospitals.' This volume consists of a series of papers prepared in 1877 for the use of those members of the State Charities Aid Association, whose duty it is to visit the public hospitals in New York County and other counties of the State, and the present is a second edition of the original work. The book is admirably arranged under a variety of heads, including hospital building, air supply and heating, drainage and water supply, interior details, hospital laundry and housekeeping, the nursing service, the care of the insane, maternity wards, village hospitals, and disinfection. As a complete handbook of hospital management and a practical guide to the care of the sick, whether in public or private hospitals or in families, it will be as valuable on this side the Atlantic as in the United

States, and it is a pleasant evidence that our American cousins are proceeding *pari passu* with ourselves in this important matter. It is also interesting to note that the wide experience of Mr. John Simon, C.B., whose reports as medical officer of the Privy Council are doubtless familiar to many of our readers, have been frequently utilised in the preparation of this volume.

From Messrs. Routledge & Son.—'Bartlett's Familiar Quotations.' This is the eighth edition, revised by the author, of an attempt to trace to their sources passages and phrases in common use. It appears that the work now contains passages from 125 authors who have not hitherto been included. The increase of pages, as against the last edition, is 380. Primarily a collection of passages from English and American authors, Mr. Bartlett's book is made an interesting comparative study in these matters by Greek, Latin, &c., citations of similar import; and it is enriched by quotations from the Bible, and by a collection of well-known sayings, with a commentary. The arrangement of the volume is very convenient. First there is an alphabetical list of the authors represented; then come the citations with a chronology of the writers, followed by the matter we have adverted to. Last, there is an index of remarkable fulness. It occupies 252 pages, and consists of more than thirty thousand entries.

From Messrs. Simpkin, Marshall, & Co.—'Days Afoot and European Sketches,' by James Baker. We are glad to see a second edition of these pictures of travel, which are of unusual variety. They give us scenes in Brittany, in Switzerland, in Bavaria, in the Palatinate, on the Rhine, in Saxony, in Saxon Switzerland, in Berlin, in Milan, and Copenhagen, and recount a voyage from Cattagat to the Baltic by lake and canal. The notabilia of these excursions are touched upon in a lively and chatty style, with evident knowledge of the people and of the places. The concluding chapter of Mr. Baker's compact little book gives interesting suggestions as to what might be done—for example that the pleasantest way of entering Switzerland is to approach it from the South, sailing from England to Genoa—while he points out that the whole distance between Flushing and Constantinople may be done on river steamers, with the exception of about two days' railway travelling.

From Mr. Stanford.—'The Englishman's Guide-book to the United States and Canada, 1883.' This work, which bears the imprint of 'G. P. Putnam's Sons,' as our neighbours quaintly style their firm, is a model guide-book, eclipsing by the number of its beautifully printed outline maps of the chief cities the majority of our English manuals. The most minute details are given on all points necessary to secure the comfort of the traveller, distances are noted, hotels described; and, making due allowance for the national admiration of the arrangements of the chief cities, the accounts given of the principal attractions are fair and trustworthy.

From the same.—'Needlework and Cutting Out: being Hints, Suggestions, and Notes for the use of Teachers in dealing with the difficulties in the Needlework Schedule,' by Kate Stanley, F.R.B.S. The head governess and teacher of needlework at Whitelands College—the National Society's chief institution for the training of school-mistresses—is, by virtue of her position, entitled to speak with authority on what is, under the recent codes, no unimportant part of our national

educational system, and we can give high praise to her manual. Needlework and cutting-out share the pages of the book, the most careful instruction being given on the intricate processes involved under each head. Miss Stanley places each part of the process before teachers in such a way that they can almost adopt her phraseology in giving their lessons to the children, and the numerous diagrams scattered throughout the pages will make the book still more useful for practical purposes.

From Mr. William Stevens.—'The Family Herald.' Volume L. The fact that our popular contemporary has reached its fiftieth volume makes it only needful for us to say that its contents seem to be marked by the same happy combination of purity and attractiveness which have won for it a deservedly high reputation. Fiction continues to form a characteristic feature in its pages, but the general essays and scientific notes contain much instructive information, and the correspondence recipes and 'family matters' complete its title to be regarded as a domestic magazine.

From Messrs. Suttaby & Co.—'The Private Devotions of Lancelot Andrewes, D.D.' A new edition, edited and revised by Edmund Venables, M.A., Precentor and Canon Residentiary of Ely, with a preface by James Russell, Lord Bishop of Ely. A welcome reprint, with all the perfection of modern type and paper, of a book which is stamped with the approval of the English Church as being in full harmony with the spirit of her authorised offices. Bishop Woodford, in his preface, describes the volume as being, not only a memorial of the piety of a former age, but a practical help to the spiritual life of successive generations, and he claims for it that it 'is in complete accord with the sobriety of the English mind, and the reverential tone of the Book of Common Prayer.' The book, which forms one of the publishers' series of 'Devotional Manuals,' has been produced under the editorship of Precentor Venables, of Lincoln, who follows Cardinal Newman's arrangement and translation of the Greek devotions, although he tells us that he has compared every sentence with the author's original, and has removed several misprints. For the devotions originally written in Latin, Canon Venables has adopted the translation made by the late Dr. Neale, but here again he has given no mere transcript, but carefully edited the text. The red margins to the pages and the adoption of the old-fashioned mode of printing give the book an antique appearance, quite in keeping with its text.

From Messrs. Ward, Lock, & Co.—'Stepping Stones to Thrift: a series of chapters, introductory to various means of laying the foundations of success in life, for girls, women, boys, men.' A book of sensible directions, good advice, and sound business-like information as to education, occupations, saving money, managing and bringing up families, trades unions, building societies, life insurance, and sundry other subjects. It might almost be styled a family encyclopædia, for there are but few matters connected with domestic and household management which are not touched upon.

From the same.—'The King of the Beggars: The Life and Adventures of George Atkins Brine.' This strange and exciting narrative is vouched for as 'a true story of vagrant life,' and its only unsatisfactory feature is that it illustrates the complete failure of our English poor-law system, and of the various remedial agencies promoted by philanthropists to reform a man who had such evident natural

gifts and not a few really high qualities as the subject of this sketch. The scenes pictured in its pages are evidently drawn from the life, and the book is well worth reading.

From **Mr. Effingham Wilson**.—*'The Merchant's Clerk: an Exposition of the Laws and Customs regulating the operations of the Counting House, with examples and practice, by John Pearce,'* twelfth edition. It seems but a few months since we commended to our readers the last edition of this practical little manual. Its definitions are brief and clear, and its explanations of commercial uses and terms are marked by all possible simplicity.

We have also received:—*'Dickens's Continental A B C Railway Guide'* (Macmillan) July, with the latest corrections from abroad.—*Ivanhoe* (Ward, Lock, & Co.) Part 8, illustrated by Marie, Lix, Rion, & Scott.—*Arabian Nights* (Ward, Lock, & Co.) Part 11.—*Concise Cyclopædia*, illustrated (Cassell & Co.) part 17, bringing the work from MACHINE to MILITIA.—*'Public Library Fifth Annual Report'* (Providence, U.S.A.) for the year 1882, with list of donors, &c.—*The Sea, Adventure, Peril, and Heroism*, illustrated (Cassell & Co.) part 10, giving incidents of Drake's great voyage, encounters with the Spanish, naval scenes, portraits, &c.—*Journal of Banking* (Rhodes & Co., New York) new No.

MAGAZINES FOR JULY.—*Merry England* (44 Essex Street, Strand), under the expressive title of *'Horny Handed Brothers,'* opens with an interesting sketch of the Benedictine monks, who were truly described by Guizot as *'the agriculturists of Europe.'* Mr. J. G. Cox's pleasant little paper on the subject has an effective illustration in a picture of *'A Cistercian Shepherd,'* drawn by Mrs. Butler of *'Roll-Call'* fame. *'The Story of a Picture'* is told by Alice Meynell, with a series of illustrations by Sir Frederick Leighton, forming a reproduction of the entire design of the President of the Royal Academy, for his work on the dome of St. Paul's, entitled *'And the Sea gave up the Dead that were in it.'* The processes gone through by the artist are carefully detailed, and these *'workshop sketches,'* whether to the art student or to the intelligent reader, will have an interest altogether unique. The pleasant little bit of gossip on books by Mr. Denis, styled *'Thoughts in a Library,'* puts in a plea, which we heartily endorse, for the personal possession of books in order that *'their full power may be known.'* A light paper on *'Bogeys of Provincial Life,'* deals smartly with *'Small Talk,'* and gives some amusing *'touches'* of the tittle-tattle in which many benevolent people spend a large part of their days. Miss Corkran is severe, but not too severe, on those members of her own sex who, to use her words, *'by their unmeaning tattle, sunder lives that might have been joined, and drive nails into the coffin of a murdered joy.'*—*The Monthly Packet* (W. Smith) begins a new story *'of the Camisard War,'* entitled *'Claude de S. Ange,'* by the author of *'Vivia Gray,'* which is pleasantly written if somewhat forced in style, and the other two bits of fiction run on. The Editor's *'Cameo from English History'* deals with the Arminian Persecution; and Miss Sewell, in her *'Letters on Daily Life,'* moralises with all her usual effectiveness on self-discipline, avoiding mysteries, and keeping secrets when there are any to keep, small fastidiousnesses and jealousies, punctuality, and other points which

to her young lady readers will be of infinite value. A series of papers on *'Elementary Physiology'* commences well, and a description is given of a society, described as *'The Guild of Aid in Home Duties,'* which ought to find an ample field for useful influence. The article explaining *'The Order for Matins and Evensong'* would under ordinary circumstances be justly described as *'padding,'* and useful though it may be, it would scarcely seem to be in its place in a serial whose readers are, we imagine, for the most part educated Church people.—*The Fireside* (1 Paternoster Buildings) gives the opening of a biographical sketch, by Mary Seeley, of Mr. Edward Bickersteth, as one of *'the later Evangelical Fathers in the Church of England.'* There is an ample variety of essays, sketches, and poems, and Dr. Boulton contributes an interesting paper on Thomas à Becket.—*The Church Standard* (same office) has a portrait of Canon Money, of Cheltenham, who so long worked at Deptford, and another portrait of which the Bishop of Hereford is the subject, but which must, we fancy, have been engraved from a photograph taken some years ago.—*Hand and Heart* (same office), devoted to the promotion of Temperance and social reform, is well edited and freely illustrated. Its chief illustration is a portrait of Mr. Samuel Sims, the military agent of the National Temperance League.—*The Penny Post* (Parker), among its budget of tales and sketches, has an interesting paper on Saumur on the Loire, with a picture of the picturesque little town.—*The Postman* (Alabaster, Passmore, & Sons) has Mr. Spurgeon for a contributor, and it carries a budget of light and readable matter, with a strong religious tone.—*The Church of England Temperance Chronicle* (10 Bridge Street, Westminster) gives full details of the work of the Church of England Temperance Society, and contains many interesting articles and notes.—*Health*, edited by Dr. Andrew Wilson (Wyman & Sons), has, among a large assortment of valuable articles, some papers on Health and Holidays, which will be specially useful at the present season. An article on the so-called system of *'Faith Healing'* is also worthy of note, both on medical and religious grounds.—*Young England* (Sunday School Union) gives a capital sketch of Russian boys and their habits and amusements, with some effective illustrations.—*The Church Sunday School Magazine* (Sunday School Institute), in addition to its series of continued articles, has a paper on *'The Indians of Amazonia,'* the country which gives to England the India-rubber which forms so important an article of our commerce. Miss Arnold-Forster tells in a graphic way of the missionary efforts carried on among the natives.—*The Church Worker* (same office) commences a series of papers entitled *'Some Facts about the National Church,'* by the Rev. T. Hancock, apparently designed to supply an answer to the statements of the Liberation Society's agents.—*The Sword and Trowel* (Passmore & Alabaster) describes in effective fashion *'Sunday Morning in St. Giles's,'* and the work of the Missionaries connected with Bloomsbury Chapel. No mention is made of what the Church of England is doing in this densely populated district. An Address by the editor, Mr. Spurgeon, on *'The Prevalence of Evil an Argument for Prayer,'* and many other attractive papers, together with an interesting account of Mr. Spurgeon's *'Stockwell Orphanage,'* fill the remaining pages.—*Amateur Work* (Ward, Lock, & Co.), with its plentiful illustrations, ought to

prove a welcome visitor in every house where young people have a mechanical turn. One of the papers by the editor tells us how to make 'A House for Dolly,' and among the other subjects dealt with are violin-making, the construction of relievo maps, pianofortes, rustic carpentry, brass casting, house-painting and papering. 'Amateurs in Council' is the title of some notes contributed by the readers of the magazine, with illustrations.—*The Christian Treasury* (Johnstone, Hunter, & Co.) gives sketches of Newton and Cowper, and a sermon preached before the General Assembly of the Free Church of Scotland on 'The Church and the Times,' which is well worthy of perusal.—Received also: *The Day of Days—Home Words—Child's Own Magazine—Sunday Scholar's Companion—Progress* (edited, during Mr. Foote's detention in prison, by Dr. Aveling), &c.

SERIALS.—Messrs.
